## Fine Reviews Given On Current Books, Wednesday's Meet

The author of the book is professor of anthropology at the University of California and the book has been written for a text in the study of socialistic problems and calls attention to the superiority complex of the many nations, and then refutes the idea of this claim. He points out in the book that there are no pure races.

Mrs. Morris gave a clear, comprehensive view of the book, that showed keen conception of the subject.

Harding reviewed "Immigration Control," by Henry Pratt Patchell, and also gave selections from the report of the special committee on immigration by Dr. Harry Laughlin of Carnegie Institute, showing various reasons why immigration control is very essential. The report was instructive and entertaining, and given in a pleasing manner.
