



### STANFORD TO IDLE UNTIL TIME NEAR FOR ROSE BOWL GO

#### Saturday Clash With California Leaves Sever Injuries — Bobby Grayson Has Pair of Cracked Ribs

PASADENA, Cal., Nov. 26.—(AP)—For the second consecutive year, Stanford was selected today to represent the west in the annual Rose tournament football game here Nov. 27.

Stanford's Rose Bowl-bound champions broke training today as the anti-climax of a football season that saw the Pacific Coast conference title safely stowed away, a bid to represent the west Nov. 27 at Pasadena anticipated and a casualty list of serious proportions by which to remember the toughest game of the year.

There will be no more practice for Stanford until the time comes to prepare for a second successive invasion of the Rose Bowl. Coach "Tiny" Thornhill, his charges and all supporters having assumed the team will be selected today.

Expect Pasadena (Cal.) "Naturally we expect the New Year's day game," said Thornhill, after Stanford had beaten California Saturday, 9 to 7. "The records speak for themselves. Stanford didn't lose or tie a conference game. No other conference team has as good a record. I'll back this team against any other in the country, the stronger the better."

Stanford came out on the long end of the score after a terrific struggle with an inspired California team, but toll was paid in the shape of seriously injured players. Fullback Bobby Grayson, potential all-American, suffered a couple of cracked ribs shortly after the start of the game, and his loss was reflected in a noticeably weakened team. Keith Topping, right end, suffered a sprained ankle, and Stan Anderson, sub fullback, was nursing a severe head cut today.

### CALIFORNIA GRID DITTY IRKS STANFORD EDITOR

STANFORD UNIVERSITY, Nov. 26.—(AP)—In an editorial headed "win or lose, fair play comes first," the Stanford daily today termed the Stanford-California football game a "bloody spectacle" and criticized the California rooting section.

The editorial objected to what it called an "obnoxious pornographic ditty in an unexpurgated version" which it said was chanted after the game by California rooters.

"The game itself—a bloody spec-

table of 60 minutes that saw fista fly and blows registered on weary flesh when the officials were looking the other way . . ." the editorial added, "was scarcely over before the California rooting section joined in a chant that has probably only been heard once before in a football stadium."

It went on to say that the once before had been last year but that it had been overlooked by Stanford in the "hope it might have been accidental and not to be repeated."

### 36-Minute Quake Shakes Up Manila

MANILA, Nov. 26.—(AP)—An earthquake, which lasted 36 minutes, shook Manila tonight, wrecking numerous bamboo dwellings in the slum district and damaging a few downtown buildings. Police had no reports of any injuries, although two women were taken to hospitals, suffering from hysterics.

The quake was declared to be the most severe felt here in several years.

### CASEY WILL QUIT HARVARD, IS HINT

CAMBRIDGE, Mass., Nov. 26.—(AP)—Eddie Casey, reliable source said today, will resign as head coach of Harvard football.

The old halfback who reeled off many a yard for Harvard in the days when the Crimson goose hung high, has decided to relinquish the reins of coachship after the most disastrous season in the history of Harvard football.

The names of several are bantered about as possible successors—Kipker, Kerr, Little, Adam Walsh, Arnold Norwren. But it was all guess work. Formal announcement of Casey's resignation has not been made.

### GONZAGA SWAMPS MONTANA, 53 TO 0

SPOKANE, Wash., Nov. 26.—(AP)—The Montana School of Mines football squad went back to Butte today without Gonzaga's scalp in its belt, but with the satisfaction of having shown that they could "take it."

### SECTIONAL TITLES WAIT OUTCOME OF WEEK'S GRID WARS

NEW YORK, Nov. 26.—(AP)—Football fires a double barreled volley this week in parting salute to a brilliant campaign.

Except in the mid-west and far west where last week's conclusive campaigning established Minnesota and Stanford in the throne rooms, sectional championships all along the line await the outcome of traditional encounters on Thursday—Thanksgiving day—and Saturday.

Although it carries no championship rating, sectional or otherwise, the prime fixture of the week will be the colorful service classic between Army and Navy at Philadelphia on Saturday. Always one of the greatest of all football box office draws, the game this year has aroused extraordinary interest, mainly because of the possibility of a navy triumph for the first time since 1921.

Stanford's Indians, winning the Pacific Coast conference crown by out-pointing California's Golden Bears 9-7, apparently are certain to be chosen as far western representative in the annual Rose Bowl game.

Callison gave liberal praise to the coaching of the Tigers, and the general all-around play.

Other interested spectators and observers at the game were Edson Jenne, coach of the Washington high school, Medford's opponent at Portland Thanksgiving day, if the game is arranged. Coach Jenne was accompanied by four of his own players, and they took liberal notes of Medford plays.

### BRONCOS RALLY TO WIN, 12 TO 6

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 26.—(AP)—A fierce, crushing fourth quarter touchdown match by the Broncos

from Santa Clara was all that gave them a 12 to 6 victory over little Columbia university of Portland and prevented another "gigantic upset" during their football game on Multnomah field here Sunday afternoon.

All during the first half of the contest the Broncos tore at the Columbia forward wall, but it wasn't until late in the second quarter that they were successful.

Starting from their own 39-yard line, and aided considerably by a penalty which gave them a first down on the Columbia twenty when officials ruled that Columbia had interfered with the receiver of a long pass thrown by Sobrero, Broncos passing ace, Santa Clara marched straight down the field to score.
