PRINCESS BARBARA LOSES POUNDAGE

NEW YORK, Nov. 27.—(AP)—Forty-four pounds thinner than she was two years ago, Princess Alexis Midvian, the former Barbara Hutton, returned from Europe today minus her polo playing prince.

But reports of a rift between them are absurd, the five and ten cent store heiress declared. As for reports that her 22nd birthday in Paris cost about \$10,000 and \$20,000—"absolutely nonsense." "It cost \$5,000 at the most," she said hotly. "If there were beds of orchids and silver champagne buckets I didn't see 'em."

Her prince has gone to India to play polo and shoot tigers, she said. "And I have no objection. He has to do something." They will meet in Egypt "or China, maybe," in January.

The princess said she has reduced from 144 to 102 pounds. Her recipe? "Don't eat. I went for three weeks with nothing but a cup of coffee at every meal. No sugar or cream. It either kills you or you lose weight."
