

# Stanford Places Four Men in Annual All-Coast Team Selections

Stanford, undefeated conference champion and western Rose Bowl representative, placed four players on the Associated Press' tenth annual all-Pacific coast mythical varsity football eleven, the consensus of nearly sixty experts throughout the far west, released today.

Two linemen and two backfield stars of the unbeaten Stanford team were named for 1934 honors. Of these, James ("Monk") Moscrip, end, and Bobby Grayson, fullback, were given unanimous votes. Three selectors named Grayson for the quarterback position, all others for fullback. One nationally known coach nominated him for captain.

### Reynolds Popular

Bob Reynolds, tackle, received a topheavy vote while Robert ("Boss") Hamilton was balloted into a place-back role by a large majority.

The only other school to place more than one man was the University of San Francisco with Larry Siemering at center and Dick Barber at tackle. Siemering, a 214 Moscrip member of the 1933 team, was the only player to repeat. Balloting from the Pacific northwest and from the southern California sector helped sweep the two San Franciscans into first places, Barber beating out Geo. Theodoratos of Washington State by a few votes. Siemering made a run-away race of it, maintaining a three-to-one advantage over Wes Muller of Stanford.

The Pacific northwest, outnumbering any other section in ballots cast, placed Charles Mucha, Washington guard, by a landslide vote and put Raymond Morse, University of Oregon, at end. Morse outstripped all candidates except Moscrip.

As a running mate to Mucha, the experts named Verd Boyer of the University of California at Los Angeles.

## ORR BOWLERS TOP ELKS LODGE RACE; CLEANERS SECOND

For the first time since the Elks bowling tourney got well under way, one team managed to shake off competitors and stand alone at the top of the heap, although the race is still so close that most any quintet in the field of 12 can yet win the coveted first money.

The Weeks & Orr squad, with 13 wins and 8 losses, is at the top of the ladder. Two teams, City Cleaners and Studabaker, are tied for second place, and three are tied for third.

Roy Pruitt and Hal Haight, with averages of 190, rule the roost as individual stars, closely pressed by Fred Erickson and George Eads. The Weeks & Orr captured last week's high match prize with 2749 points and Hugh Rankin won the individual high match prize with 625 pins.

Following the rolling of a postponed game Sunday, it was determined that Herb Strang won high individual prize for the week ending November 1, with a total of 672, while the weekly prize went to the Highway Barbers with 2699.

The vote was the heaviest ever cast for all-Pacific coast.

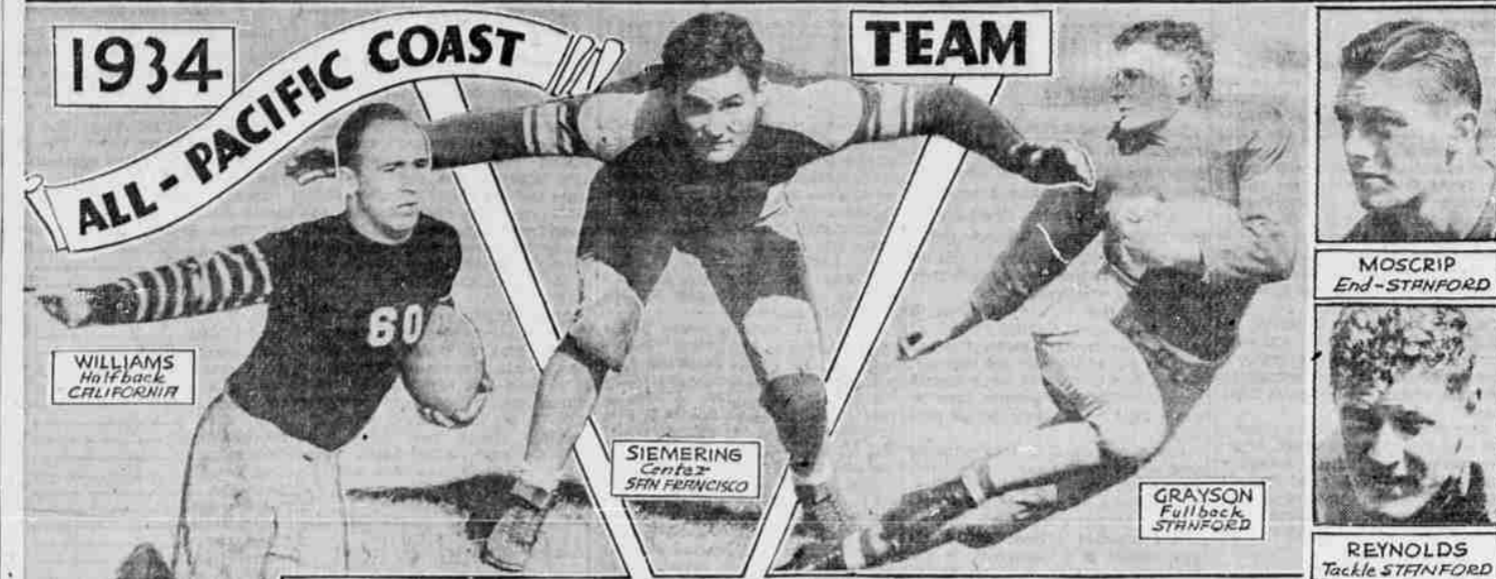
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## GIANT GERMAN FACES RED DEMON WRESTLER AT ARMORY THURSDAY
