

### BUSY YEAR SHOWN FOR HOME AGENT IN ANNUAL REPORT

The annual report for the Home Demonstration work in Jackson county for the period from December 1st, 1933, to November 30, 1934, which has just been completed shows an increase in activities and results, and reports eight months of work by Mabel O. Mack, home demonstration agent and four months of work by Alice Mallin, who is acting home demonstration agent during Mrs. Mack's absence from the county to serve as acting state leader of Home Economics extension.

Four hundred meetings were held during the year with a total attendance of 9896. These meetings included project work on foods and nutrition, relief canning, child care and training, clothing and recreation, and dramatics.

The meetings were conducted by the home demonstration agent or by trained project leaders.

During the year 31 training meetings were held for project leaders with a total attendance of 1162. The use of project leaders aids in extending the work to a larger number of homemakers and more communities, and makes it possible to carry more project work during the year.

There are now eighteen organized home extension units in the county with a total membership of 424, that carry regular project work each month. The agent meets with each unit every other month and trained project leaders conduct the demonstration on alternate months.

### COUNTY'S BUDGET HEARING SLATED FOR WEDNESDAY

Public hearing on the annual budget for Jackson county for the coming year, will be held in the courthouse auditorium tomorrow morning at 10 o'clock, with State Senator George W. Dunn, chairman of the budget committee, presiding. A. C. Hubbard of this city, W. J. Freeman of Central Point, and the county court, as members of the budget committee, will also be present.

Certification of the budget, for extension of the levies on the tax rolls, is expected to be completed by the first of the month.

The budget total is approximately the same as last year. Relief and road work are the main items. The heaviest increase in the budget is for state old age pensions. The appropriation was raised from \$5,000 to \$20,000. The appropriation for all relief approximately \$70,000.

Road appropriations are for maintenance and repairs to roads already constructed. Main important rural roads are in need of repairs, and unless given attention the county is apt to lose its original investment.

### CARS DAMAGED IN HIGHWAY SMASHUP

State police reported today that in an accident Sunday evening on the Pacific highway near the Klamath Falls junction two cars were badly damaged, but their drivers escaped injury.

The accident occurred, it was reported, when Mitchell's car's brakes locked and the vehicle skidded across the wet pavement into the oncoming auto.

### MANN'S BURGLARY GUILT ADMITTED BY MEDFORD TRIO

Beulah Wilcox, 18, and Stanley Howard, 23, of Medford, charged with complicity in the robbery of Mann's Department store, on the night of October 24, entered a plea of guilty late yesterday to receiving stolen goods before Circuit Judge H. D. Norton.

Leonard Clark, another member of the gang, entered a plea of guilty to burglary of Mann's store.

Glen Stinger, 23, another member of the alleged gang, arrested in Albany, Ore., last Saturday, is scheduled to appear in circuit court today and enter a plea.

Passing of sentence has been deferred until a later date.

All of the property stolen from Mann's store, valued at \$300, has been recovered, with the exception of two suits of clothes, authorities say.

The district attorney's office reported that the apprehension of the quartet, and their admissions, will result in the clearing of a number of cases of thieving and burglary in this vicinity over a two-year period.
