over to the assessor's office for extension on the roll.
Assessor Coleman estimated that the county tax for the coming year will be approximately the same as last year, with possibly a slight reduction.
Main items in the new budget are for relief, old age pensions, and road work. Relief and old age pension funds are mandatory upon the county. In the next legislative session measures will be introduced to provide funds for this purpose and thus relieve some of the financial burden from the county.

URSCHEL KIDNAPER CONVICTION GIVEN HIGH COURT'S OKEH

the Kansas penitentiary when he participated in the kidnaping.
Bailey was sentenced to life imprisonment. A similar sentence was given Kelly and Bates and Mr. and Mrs. R. G. Shannon, on whose farm near Paradise, Texas, Urschel was held captive nine days.
Kelly's red-haired wife also was convicted in connection with the kidnaping, as well as Barney Berman and Clifford Skelly of Minneapolis, and the Shannons' son Angus.
Bates and Kelly were alleged to have been the actual kidnapers of Urschel, who was abducted from his home in Oklahoma City on July 22, 1933.
Bailey was the leader of a prison break at the Lansing, Kans. prison farm which freed 11 desperadoes, and he also was indicted in connection with the Kansas City union station slayings.
He appealed his conviction, imposed by Federal District Judge Edgar S. Vaughn, on the grounds the sentence was "cruel and unusual."

SKELETON OF WOMAN LONG DEAD FOUND IN WILD DOG LAKE AREA

KLAMATH FALLS, Nov. 30.—(P)—The Lake County Examiner today published a story describing the discovery of a woman's skeleton in a remote section of the Dog lake country.
The find was made by L. D. Bailey, a local ranger.
Dog lake is 80 miles east of Klamath Falls in Lake county.
The Examiner believes the bones those of an unidentified woman sent west years ago by a matrimonial bureau.
The skeleton was carefully covered by mahogany brush. Scraps of newspapers, the Examiner said, were found with the bones and placed the time of death within 25 or 30 years. State police had previously said the bones were at least 75 years old.
The small bones of an unborn child were found with those of the woman.
The article said the Dog lake country was known as a moonshiners' headquarters as recently as 12 years ago.
One of the woman's legs was broken but there were no other visible marks of violence.

ALBERT K. SNODGRASS PASSES IN CALISTOGA

Word has been received in Medford of the death Wednesday of Albert King Snodgrass of Calistoga, Cal., former Medford resident and pioneer of this section. Mr. Snodgrass was 87 years old at the time of his death.
Mr. Snodgrass resided here until about four or five years ago, when he went to California. He had been ill for the past year.
Surviving him are his wife, Della Snodgrass, and the following daughters: Mrs. A. M. Wall of Medford, Mrs. Elsie Regis of Glendale, Ore., Mrs. Roy Pelletreau of near San Francisco, Mrs. Linnie Stevens and Mrs. Fred Bauer of Gold Beach, another daughter at Pistol River, Ore., Lella Snodgrass; also three sons, June, Loyal and Revis Snodgrass, all of Calistoga.

STEAL GAS FROM AUTO OF JUSTICE

A gasoline thief last night daringly stole about a gallon of gasoline from the auto of Justice of the Peace William B. Coleman, while the machine was parked in the magistrate's backyard. This is the second time in two weeks that the same offense has occurred.
