

SEWAGE DISPOSAL IS MANDATORY IN SOME OF STATES

Following places in Tuesday's special election on the sewage disposal bond issue will be as follows:

First ward, Public market; second ward, court house; third ward, Fichtner's garage; fourth ward, city hall.

Medford is fortunate that its citizens can vote on a sewage disposal plant, as was pointed out by chamber of commerce officials yesterday, as in some states it is almost mandatory for plants to be erected. A recent ruling of the Ohio supreme court makes it mandatory that Ohio cities construct sewage treatment plants when ordered to do so by the state department of health. This is of particular interest to municipal engineers, chamber of commerce officials point out, since the precedent set down in this court ruling may possibly be followed by courts in many other states when a similar condition arises.

It is believed by chamber officials that the bond issue will pass by a substantial majority on December 4, especially in view of the fact that the federal government is giving an outright grant of \$22,000.

The government's interest in local projects throughout the United States is expressed primarily for the purpose of putting men to work as is evidenced by the following telegram sent by President Roosevelt to the United States conference of mayors upon the occasion of their annual meeting:

"We are at the point now where the states and municipalities interested in public works projects should come forward quickly with proposals which will give immediate work to their unemployed. We want to cooperate to the fullest possible extent and I assure you that after your projects have been passed upon by the state advisory boards they will be acted upon in Washington with a minimum of delay. We will match speed with you. The money is available and we want to put men to work."

GRAND JURY HOLDS HIGH BROTHERS ON BARN FIRE CLAIM

George High, and his brother, Robert (Babe) High, residents of the Ashland district, were indicted by the grand jury late Friday, and charged with "burning with intent to injure the insurer." The grand jury, Jos. Hubbard of Butte Falls, chairman, adjourned without reporting on any other case.

The High brothers were re-arrested Saturday and new bonds in the sum of \$2500 filed for their release.

The scheduled preliminary hearing of the High brothers called for Saturday morning was nullified by the grand jury action.

The High's were arrested a week ago by the state police and sheriff's office. The warrants grew out of the destruction by fire on the evening of January 4, 1933 of the barn on the Balfour Guthrie tract near Ashland. The barn was insured for \$15,000, authorities said. Ninety tons of hay, belonging to another person, was destroyed. The barn was one of the largest in southern Oregon.

The car, stolen Nov. 9, is a 1930 Buick sedan belonging to Pay Motor Car Co., Wenatchee, Wash. Its bumper, according to police, had been removed and traded for gasoline. The three prisoners drove to San Francisco in the stolen machine, police said, and were enroute back north, having been staying here a few days at the transient center.

SEASON ON MUSKRAT OPEN AFTER DEC. 1

State police of the same division announced Saturday that there has been a change made in the trapping regulations for fur bearing animals, providing that the open season on muskrat now begins Dec. 1. The season previously began January 1.

An official addenda to the Oregon hunting laws announces the change, and provides that the season shall extend until February 28 of the following year, both dates inclusive. This change is effective in all Oregon with the exception of Klamath county, where the season on muskrat remains from January 1 to April 15, both dates inclusive.

WIND, RAIN LASH MARSHFIELD AREA SNOW IN KLAMATH

PORTLAND, Dec. 1.—(AP)—Oregon coast towns today set themselves to the task of repairing damage wrought yesterday and last night by one of the worst gales of the season.

Heavy seas lashed the coastline as times reached a 65-mile velocity as it stirred the sea into great waves. Today, however, moderate north-west winds prevailed as the southerly gale subsided.

A raging snow storm broke over Klamath county in southern Oregon and today snow plows were churning busy. Main highways were being kept open. At Crater Lake national park six feet of snow had fallen.

Marshfield, on the mid-Oregon coast, had its worst gale in several years. Highways were blocked by falling trees and by earthslides. Communication was disrupted. The cyclonic storm tore away awnings, uprooted trees and battered flimsy structures.
