

LEIGH SWINSON'S FUNERAL FRIDAY AT SACRAMENTO

SACRAMENTO, Cal., Dec. 1.—(Sp.)—Funeral services were conducted Friday at 2 o'clock in the Eastern Star Temple for Fred Leigh Swinson, 43, sales manager of the Bassalt Rock company of Napa and former Sacramentan, who met death Tuesday night when his car crashed into a stone bridge west of Napa.

Swinson, sales representative for the rock company in this city two years ago when he was named sales manager, had been a member of the Sacramento Rotary club and a post of the American Legion. He served for several terms as editor of The Pulse, a publication of the local Rotary club.

A native of Washington, Swinson received his education in the University of Oregon and the University of Washington and at the outbreak of the World war was employed by The Mail Tribune of Medford, Ore. In the war he saw active service as an ensign in the navy. He had been with the rock company since 1924.

He was a member of Phi Delta Theta and three honorary fraternities of the University of Oregon. His wife, Mrs. Marie Swinson, is mother advisor of the Napa Assembly, Order of Rainbow for Girls, of which her daughter, Barbara, a high school student, is a member.

Besides his family, Swinson leaves his mother, Mrs. George Hoffman of Marysville, and two brothers, Verne D. Swinson of Yuba City and K. Deane Swinson of Napa.

His business associates and a number of Sacramento acquaintances served as pall bearers.
