

FLUHRER BAKERY INTRODUCES NEW BREAD IN VALLEY

Utilizing imported Sesame seed from far off India in an unusual and novel way, Fluhrer's Bakery of this city today announced the introduction of a new bread for southern Oregon and northern California customers.

The new bread, which is a distinct departure from previous bread practices, has a quaint flavor and aroma entirely different from the usual run of breads. Toasting qualities are said to enhance the unusual flavor resulting from the use of the Sesame seed which is distributed on the outer crust of the bread.

Sesame bread is something new in the United States and was first introduced by a California bakery a few months ago, and met with instant success. Since then a number of bakeries have been experimenting with its use. Fluhrer's bakery has been baking experimental Sesame bread for their retail customers during the past month and reports to unusual demand which prompted them to introduce it to their wholesale dealers.

The new bread is being announced on the first anniversary of the building of the new Fluhrer Bakery, which is recognized as one of the finest bakeries of its size on the Pacific coast. Bakers from all over the coast have come to Medford to inspect this model institution, which includes a number of improvements and methods new to baking institutions of this section of the country. Over 40 employees are given year around employment by this firm whose payroll each week is a substantial portion of the amount released by the various distributing firms of this city, according to W. H. Fluhrer. Institutions of this type have done much to insure Medford's position as the commercial and distributing center of southern Oregon and northern California.

The new bread, wrapped in a distinctive blue wrapper, is on sale at all grocers in southern Oregon and northern California, according to Fluhrer.

GRANTS PASS P. O. SITE UNPOPULAR WITH DR. BYWATER

GRANTS PASS, Dec. 3.—(Sp.)—After calling for objections to a new site which he proposed for erection of a Grants Pass federal building in place of the one which has already been selected by the government, Dr. Edward N. Bywater Friday night sent telegrams to President Roosevelt saying 810 persons at a mass meeting voted 100 per cent for a new site at the corner of Eighth and G streets.

The copy of the telegram, Bywater furnished, bore the names of Dr. Bywater, J. A. Wilson, Ella G. Hogan, E. P. Hogan, and J. C. Calhoun.

Bywater also sent similar telegrams to Governor-elect Charles H. Martin and Walter M. Pierce, congressman of the eastern Oregon district.

An audience at the armory Friday night estimated by the reporter present at slightly more than 120 persons heard Dr. Bywater relate for two hours his personal history, arguments against the present site, and what he said was the method by which the present site was selected.

Bywater claimed a 99 1/2 per cent unanimous vote for his Eighth and G street site after first asking if the audience wanted to hear more about the present site. None present replied. He then, after several interjections, asked if the audience favored his own choice. Several votes were taken, with hands showing ranging from five to 40 in favor.

Bywater shouted down one person in the audience who attempted to ask him if requests for a change of site might not lose employment for the district. He used forceful language frequently and at times employed barnyard terms.

He attacked several persons by name and by metaphor, including north side business men and Governor-elect Martin, for whom he said he was sorry he voted.

FOUR YOUTHS HELD IN ALLEGED THEFT OF WINE SUPPLIES

Four youths, three from Central Point and one from Medford, were given until 10 o'clock tomorrow morning to decide whether to waive or demand preliminary hearing on charges of burglary not in a dwelling, when arraigned before Justice of the Peace Wm. R. Coleman this morning.

They are Jack Viguers, 18, of 1704 North Riverside, Medford, and Ernest Michael Helling, 24, Jerry Edward Helling, 19, Elmer Thomas Sparks, 21, all of Central Point. They were arrested by state police in this city Sunday, charged with larceny of grape juice and wine from the cellar of Martin Zanon, of Central Point. The alleged theft occurred Nov. 22.

After committing them to the county jail, Justice of the Peace Coleman granted them extra time because they were unable to make decisions this morning. Coleman said he believes all four will waive.

Donald Culbertson, about 21, of Central Point, arrested by state police last Friday night on charges of disorderly conduct, was released from the county jail today by Justice Coleman, after investigation showed that he was not implicated in the wine theft.

HIGH BROTHERS DENY BURNING OF ASHLAND BARN FOR INSURANCE

George W. High, and his brother Robert (Babe) High, of Ashland, indicted by the grand jury last Friday for alleged "burning with intent to injure the insurer," were arraigned in circuit court this morning and entered pleas of not guilty to the charge. Monday, January 7 was set as date for the trial.

Indicted with the High brothers was Theodor Martin, now held in the Multnomah county jail at Portland, on a burglary charge.

Joe Holland entered a plea of guilty to the same charge last week, and sentence is held in abatement.

The indictment alleges that the defendants, in January 1933, set fire to the large barn on the Balfour Guthrie tract, one mile east of Ashland, for the alleged purpose of defrauding the insurance company. The barn was insured for \$10,000. At the time of the fire it contained 90 tons of hay belonging to another.

In a suit in federal court, a jury returned a verdict in favor of the High's.

Attorney George M. Roberts appeared as counsel for the defendants today and asked five days in which to file a motion.
