CCC MEN CONTRIBUTE TO COMMUNITY CHEST SEVEN OREGON CITIES

Each man of the 3700 members of Civilian Conservation Corps in Medford district is contributing from 10 to 50 cents to the Community Chest funds of seven cities in Oregon and California that are the railroad centers for the CCC camps.

With the contributions coming in practically 100 per cent from the 28 camps in Medford district, the spirit of the men of the CCC is again shown to be back of every large public movement that has been started since the establishment of the Civilian Conservation Corps last year.

Considering that there are some 200 men or more in every CCC camp, the Community Chest funds of the railroad cities should be greatly aided. In Oregon, the cities of Medford district that will receive the donations of the CCC men are: Medford, Roseburg, Grants Pass, Marshfield and Gold Beach. Yreka and Crescent

\$522,426,189 Handed To American Farmers Since Formation of AAA

WASHINGTON, Dec. 4.—(AP)—The cash dispensing machinery of the Agricultural Adjustment Administration has sent \$522,426,189 to farmers.

This total, announced today, covers disbursements up to the end of November. It includes all rental and benefit payments made under cotton, corn-hog, tobacco and wheat adjustment programs and more than \$81,000,000 to cotton producers for taking part in the cotton option pool and exercising options on cotton held by the government.

At the same time, the AAA announced state totals for the \$421,037,389 paid out up to November 1. Processing tax collections were shown to be running ahead of payments as of the same date. They totaled \$550,081,419.

Besides benefit payments, the AAA paid out \$169,389,731 to remove surpluses of pork, cotton, lard, wheat, butter, cheese, cattle and seeds.

As of November 28, cotton farmers had received \$241,738,071; tobacco growers, \$18,030,128; wheat farmers \$130,590,550; and corn-hog producers \$132,007,326.

Expenditures for removal of surplus commodities up to November 1 were: Hogs, \$46,039,849; wheat, \$5,671,855; sheep and goats purchased in drought areas, \$2,293,887; seed purchases, \$11,835,603; butter and cheese, \$12,322,929.

The following table shows rental and benefit payments made, administrative expenses of the AAA, surplus expenditures by states, and amounts spent in foreign countries for research or other activities connected with the program.
