ive attitude whether I be a Borah Republican or a Fletcher Republican or neither of these things.

"Certain prominent Republican senators have been carrying on devastating campaigns, or at least they have been trying to make them devastating, against certain agencies of the New Deal. Borah did it in Idaho and Senator Reed in Pennsylvania and I can't see much difference between the two.

Offered No Substitute
"Although these campaigns were made by two outstanding senators whom the public regards as representing different factions in the Republican party, neither one was successful because they offered no substitutes for the programs they criticized.

"We all admit that some of Mr. Roosevelt's experiments have not worked. Mr. Roosevelt, himself, perhaps would admit that. I do not think even Borah and Reed would take the position that nothing should be done by the government. And so I invite them, and especially Senator Borah, to suggest a platform for what he believes would be an ideal Republican party."

PLANES AND SHIPS COMBING SURFACE IN HONOLULU AREA

(Continued from page one.)

by Lieut. R. H. Clark departed to join the search. It was equipped to alight if desirable on the surface of the sea.

An SOS message picked up by the Globe wireless a few minutes before 9 a. m. was very strong, and the operator said he believed Uim was following his beacon toward Kaena Point, the northwest corner of Oahu.

Search Begins
A determined search by all available air and surface craft began under the direction of Commander E. W. Todd, commander of the fleet air base at Pearl Harbor.

Commander Todd declared: "I have already sent nine planes southward and have nine more which will be in the air in a few minutes to go northward. The commandant of Pearl Harbor is arranging to dispatch surface vessels, destroyers and mine layers in the search."

"All naval planes are seaplanes, which can alight down on the water and pick up Uim and his companions until help comes."

"We are handicapped because we do not know exactly which direction he is in."

"Captain Uim seemed to think he had passed the islands and was southward of here. But he passed over the President Coolidge about 500 miles out at 4 a. m., which would seem to indicate that perhaps he had not yet reached the islands."

Cover Wide Area
"The planes will travel out in a radius of 250 miles in all directions. We hope to locate Uim soon. We will go out in a great circle of the course besides other directions."

Army and navy authorities intimated a belief Uim was down 200 miles northeast of Honolulu.

The President Coolidge, approaching Honolulu from San Francisco, wireless it was abandoning its course to join the search. The ship estimated that from the time Uim passed it that it must be fairly near the plane the plane descended to the ocean.
