GRID FATALITIES SHOW DECLINE IN PRESENT SEASON

26 Deaths This Fall Attributable to Game—36 Deaths Listed Last Year—High Schools Lose Most Players

NEW YORK, Dec. 4.—(AP)—Football fatalities continued to show a decline this year from the high mark of 1931, when the tragic death of Cadet Dick Sheridan, West Point end, shocked the country and led to rule changes and closer supervision by colleges and high schools over America's national fall sport.

The fourth annual survey of the Associated Press, made in collaboration with Prof. Floyd R. Eastwood of New York University, and the National Bureau of Casualty and Surety Underwriters, shows 26 deaths this fall attributable to football as compared to 36 in 1931, 36 in 1932 and 36 last year.

Most in High Schools.
They are segregated as follows: College 1 high school 16, sandlot 6, and club 3.

The college death toll is a decrease from 8 in 1931, 2 in 1932 and 2 in 1933. High school fatalities increased from 14 three years ago, 8 in 1932, and 21 last year, sandlot deaths from 10 in 1931, 8 in 1932, and 5 in 1933, and club from 2 in 1931, 5 in 1932, and 2 in 1933.

Classified as to the type of play, eight received fatal injuries in making tackles, one in blocking and four in being tackled. Information is lacking on the others.

Prisoner a Victim.
For the first time since Warden Lewis E. Lawes of Sing Sing introduced the game as a part of prison routine, a prisoner in a state institution is listed among the fatalities.

John Davidson of the Connecticut state prison at Hartford, died October 14, of a skull fracture received in a game at the prison with a club team from outside. He had served two years of a 4-6 year sentence for the theft of an automobile.

Only 14 of the 26 received their injuries in actual games, six being hurt in practice and the other six in unsupervised matches on vacant lots.

One youngster, 13-year-old John Rogers of Arlington, Mass., was killed when a sharp root penetrated his breast as he was tackled in a sandlot contest.

GEHRIG ALSO LEADER
OF AMERICAN LEAGUE
RUN 'BATTER-INNERS'

CHICAGO, Dec. 4.—(AP)—In addition to winning the American league batting championship, Lou Gehrig led the circuit in runs batted in for the fifth season.

The Yankees' big first baseman drove in 169 runs, ten short of his league record, and in winning the honor, tied his illustrious teammate, Babe Ruth, who also has led the circuit five times since 1920, the year they started publishing such figures.

Gehrig also finished runner-up to Jimmy Fox of the Athletics in working the pitchers or perhaps scaring them into leaving walks. Fox was passed 111 times, while Gehrig walked 109 times. Ruth, still dangerous, drew 103 passes.

At Simmons set a record by chasing home 100 or more runs for the eleventh season, and the Tigers, in numbering four players, Greenberg, Gehrig, Rager, and O'Brien, among those batting in 100 or more times, presented something unusual.

TULANE, TEMPLE
IN 'SUGAR BOWL'

NEW ORLEANS, Dec. 4.—(AP)—New Year's day will usher in another football classic when Tulane and Temple meet here in the inaugural Sugar Bowl clash.

The two were chosen for the battle yesterday by the Mid-Winter Sports association which is arranging for the game. Both accepted.

Temple, coached by Glenn "Pop" Warner, is unbeaten but its record is marred by two ties, one 7-7 with Indiana and the other 0-0 with Bucknell.

Tulane, co-champion of the southwestern conference with Alabama, has lost only to Colgate, 20-8.

Bearcat Battle

SALEM, Ore., Dec. 4.—(AP)—Willamette university's football season for 1934 appeared closed yesterday, following announcement by R. S. (Spec) Keene, Bearcat coach, that College of Idaho, co-champion of the northwest conference championship with Willamette, had declined to play a post-season game here December 15, to decide the title holder.

Loren Bader, coach of Idaho, stated that the faculty of that school did not approve of the post-season contest.

TROJAN COLLAPSE PUZZLE TO JONES AS CLASSIC NEARS

LOS ANGELES, Dec. 4.—(AP)—Reaching the last lap of a dismal football season, with Notre Dame en route west to administer the coup de grace, Coach Howard Jones frankly admitted he is "completely baffled" by the collapse of his gridiron warriors.

The head man of the Trojans has grown many gray hairs this fall. He looks older every day. He has worked harder with the 1934 Trojans than with any of his other teams. The results have been the worst ever.

Had it not been for the one complete reversal of form, when U. S. C. soundly thrumped Oregon, Jones' team would have been blanketed in the Pacific coast conference.

"Really, I don't know what we'll be able to do against Notre Dame Saturday," Jones said. "Some of these boys played badly against Washington last week. The ones who looked good on offense were bad on defense, and vice versa. But it's too late to do any changing around at this stage. If we should decide to swing around, the problem would be the starting point."

FIRST KAYO FOR
MICKEY WALKER

PHILADELPHIA, Dec. 4.—(AP)—After winning two world's championships, fighting all weights from welter to heavy, Mickey Walker has suffered his first knockout.

The Shrewsbury Manor, N. J., veteran lost to the younger and more agile Paul Pirrone, of Cleveland, at Convention Hall last night when two short chops to the chin sent him down at the end of two minutes and 18 seconds of the 11th of what was to have been a 12-round fight.

With bleeding cuts over two half-closed eyes, Walker was defenseless as the eleventh chucker began. Then 11,000 spectators saw him take the count for the first time, after being down for the count of nine in the second.

Pirrone, who was credited with getting most of the rounds, weighed in at 150, while Walker tipped the scales at 162.

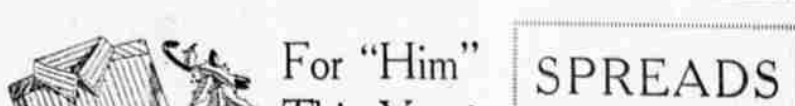
