

# FAULTY SEWERS KEEP CITY CREW BUSY IN MONTH

### City Superintendent's November Report Shows Large Amount of Work Done—21 Plugs Reported

Fred Scheffel, city superintendent, submitted a report to the city council last night of the work accomplished during the month of November, and outstanding was the large amount of work necessitated because of the faulty sewer system.

Mr. Scheffel's report follows: **Alleys:** Swept alleys in business district once each week.

**Airport:** Cleaned a portion of open drains from end of main concrete drains.

**Buildings:** Retreated floors in city hall with coating of Glymo.

**Parks and playgrounds:** Work on Palm fountain in the city park is complete with the exception of the installation of lights and Boy Scout monument.

**Installed concrete shutoff box for water lines to new fountain.**

**Streets:** Hauled 140 cubic yards of gravel and buckshot to bed holes in streets.

**Excavated and smoothed out intersection at South Oakdale and Stewart avenue.**

**Excavated and installed concrete drain at intersection of South Peach and West Twelfth street.**

**Installed 80 feet of six-inch concrete drain front of Sunrise auto camp on South Riverside avenue.**

**Two men were busy six days patching bad holes in pavement.**

**The street sweeper swept 858 miles of paving, picking up 222 cubic yards of debris.**

**The street grader operated five days during the month.**

**Sewers:** A break developed in the main trunk sewer system across the Pacific and Eastern railroad. We found the pipe across the tracks was metal; it was necessary to install 80 feet of 18-inch concrete pipe to replace the metal pipe which had completely collapsed.

**We are also replacing the main Jackson street line across the Southern Pacific railroad. This line also collapsed due to faulty bell ends.**

**Answered 21 calls for plugged sewers.**

**It was necessary to keep catch-basins clean several days due to the heavy rains. Two men were busy on this work most of the month.**

**Septic tank:** Removed the chlorinator to the warehouse. Two men were busy four days repairing septic tank at fair grounds.

**Street and traffic signs:** Installed 80 additional street signs. Repaired 24 stop signs. Replaced 27 street signs torn down on Halloween.

**Equipment:** The work of overhauling the street flusher and installing a new engine will be finished in a week's time.

**State emergency relief work:** An average of 100 men were working on the Bear Creek flood control project. We have an approval for an additional allotment. The following is the status of the work: Allotted, \$29,457; expended, \$17,621.67; balance, \$11,835.33.

## CANYONVILLE AUTOIST DIES OF CRASH INJURY

ROSEBURG, Ore., Dec. 4.—(AP)—Cecil Hartle, 29, resident of Canyonville, died in the Roseburg hospital this morning as the result of injuries suffered last night in an automobile accident six miles south of this city.

Hartle, according to state police who investigated the accident, was driving his car at a high rate of speed when it failed to negotiate a turn and rolled over several times before the highway. Victor Rice, who was riding with Hartle, escaped with minor injuries.
