Three men arrested here last Friday for the theft of a car belonging to the Fay Motor Car Co., Wenatchee, Wash., were bound over to the grand jury Tuesday on a \$1500 bail after appearing on a federal complaint before U. S. Commissioner Victor A. Tengwald.

The trio, Walter J. Czarwinski, 30, of Milwaukie, Ore.; Henry A. Coston, 35, of Pullman, Wash., and Mike Pettello, 21, of Plymouth Pa., were arraigned before Commissioner Tengwald on charges of unlawful transportation of a motor vehicle in interstate commerce, while knowing the automobile to be stolen.

All three were committed to the county jail upon failure to produce bail. They waived preliminary hearing. City police, who made the arrests said the stolen car, a 1930 Chrysler sedan, had been driven to San Francisco and that the three men were en route back north, having stopped briefly at the Medford transient center.

Commissioner Tengwald said Czarwinski and Pettello claimed to have joined Coston at Seattle after the latter supposedly stole the auto in Wenatchee.

wards, with the second, at the courthouse recording the largest number. In the first ward, at the city market, 158 votes were cast, with 148 yes, and 10 no. The largest percentage of yes was shown in the second ward, at the county courthouse, where 251 were yes, and 101 no.

At Pichtner's garage, where the third ward votes were tabulated, 230 voted yes and 45 voted no, out of the 263 votes cast. There were 170 votes cast at the city hall and 43 no, where 213 votes were counted for the fourth ward.

Mayer George Porter is out of town for two days, and could not be contacted for a statement concerning the passing of the bond.

Harder Pleased Ben E. Harder, president of the Jackson county chamber of commerce which conducted an active campaign for the passing of the measure, said this forenoon: "I am highly gratified on the overwhelming vote in favor of the new system. HINT STARTLING DEVELOPMENT IN KIDNAP HEARING

was introduced in evidence yesterday. The money was identified by numerous witnesses as a portion of sums found in wallets belonging to Alvin H. Scott and dug up on the premises of the house he occupied by Scott and Miss Margaret Hurlienne at Medford. Scott and Miss Hurlienne were the only alleged conspirators before the commissioner.

Three glass fruit jars, dug out of the ground by investigating officers, were entered as evidence. Their contents were removed and replaced several times as witnesses made identifications. M. B. Lindquist identified a jar containing \$400 in \$20 federal reserve notes which, he said, he dug up at the site of a razed barn at the Medford place.

Another jar containing 73 \$20 federal reserve notes also went into evidence, along with a money bag found in a third jar. The money bag, according to Coo A. MacKinnon, state officer, contained \$795 in \$5 and \$10 bills. The same jar gave forth the wedding certificate of Clara Feldman and George L. Davis, issued May 17, 1933, at Denver, Colo., and several gold pieces, totaling \$90. A draft on a Denver bank, dated July 17, 1933, for \$2000, payable to Mrs. George L. Davis, also was found in one of the jars.

Women Sit Quietly Throughout the hearing Miss Hurlienne and Scott, flanked by their attorneys, Roscoe Hurst and Elton Watson, sat quietly. Whether they will be called to the stand today was not indicated by their counsel.

Miss Hurlienne, usually smiling, caught the eye of every government witness. She was attractively garbed in a full-length coat of light brown dyed ermine, a dark brown felt hat and brown shoes of suede and kid. Visible on the back of Scott's head was the wound which accompanied the skull fracture he received in an automobile accident near Roseburg early in November.

Miss Hurlienne and Scott were purchasing the Medford property where they resided from the Jackson County Building and Loan association, J. H. Fletcher, representative of the company, testified. Miss Hurlienne had signed the option to buy.

\$20 Notes Identified F. A. Grimmsell, special agent of the division of investigation, department of justice, and Phil Stansbury, deputy sheriff of Jackson county, testified that \$1100 of the money found on Scott was \$20 Kansas City federal reserve notes. Grimmsell stated that he checked them against the list of series numbers of the original ransom notes given in the Oruchel case and found them listed.

Two of the glass jars containing money were found at the Medford house in a combination woodshed and garage, buried in the ground, by Officer MacKinnon.

Almost every investigating officer called to the stand during the day was cross-examined on the subject of manure and fertilizer found around the Medford place. The reason for the line of questioning was not brought out.

MINA JANE STURGES OF ROSS LANE DIES; FUNERAL THURSDAY

Mina Jane Sturges, wife of W. J. Sturges, passed away at their residence on Ross lane early this morning at the age of 79 years.

Mrs. Sturges was born at Frankfort, Minn., June 29, 1855. She was married at Live Springs, Iowa in July, sixty-four years ago. The family came to Oregon in 1894 and since that time have resided in Linn county before coming to Grants Pass where they made their home before coming to Medford.

Mrs. Sturges has been a devoted member of the Methodist church practically all her life and until failing health came upon her, was an ardent worker in that faith.

Besides her husband she leaves five children, Mrs. H. B. Dossee of Brownsville, Oregon; Mrs. J. C. Galahon, Grants Pass; Mrs. W. E. Nicholson, Medford; Mrs. Belle Nell, Cascade Locks, Ore., and D. W. Sturges of Cottage Grove. Also 12 grand children and 14 great grand children.

Funeral services will be conducted by the Rev. Joseph Knotts at the Conger chapel at 2:00 p. m. Thursday, Interment in Medford I. O. O. F. cemetery.
