

LLOYD GEORGE'S MEMOIRS BOOST CLAIMS OF U. S.

Britisher Bares Real War Facts in Latest Volume—Allies Relied On America for Additional Effort

LONDON, (UP)—America's part in winning the World war and the preponderant importance of her military intervention gradually is emerging with publication of the memoirs of allied war statesmen.

Publication of the fourth volume of David Lloyd George's "War Memoirs" has thrown more light on the vital importance of America's part.

Ever since the Armistice America's military part in bringing the war to a victorious end has been depreciated widely in Europe. One of the principal reasons was that the Allies did not want to pay their war debts.

Some Extracts
Extracts from the book included documents which were hitherto secret give a different picture.

Here are some excerpts:
"Lord Milner, Bonar Law and I thought the project (plans for the battle at Passchendaele) a mistake. When Britain, with practically the only unshaken army, was holding the pass until the Americans arrived." (Page 2185).

"The salient facts as to the condition of the French army and the extent of the demoralization in its ranks also were withheld or minimized. We were not told that the French plan was to wait for the Americans and meanwhile to increase their equipment, husband the allied resources and only engage in limited operations not involving heavy casualties." (Page 2187).

Quotes From Report
Lloyd George quotes as follows from a report submitted to the British cabinet by Sir William Robertson, chief of the imperial general staff, at the end of 1917: "Our task is to do our utmost to ensure holding our own until America arrives; and meanwhile make every effort to expedite her arrival." (Page 2247).

In a letter to President Wilson on September 3, 1917, Lloyd George said:
"Our allies... consciously or unconsciously, rely upon the British and the Americans to supply that additional effort which is necessary in order to make certain of a just, liberal and lasting peace. As you must be aware, the appearance of the vanguard of the American army has produced a tremendous effect, especially in France." (Page 2266).

KYLE PUGH TRIAL ON SYNDICALISM TO START FRIDAY

Trial of Kyle Pugh, claiming to be a resident of Josephine county, charged with criminal syndicalism, will start tomorrow morning before a circuit court jury. It is the first time in the history of Jackson county that a defendant has been tried under the Oregon criminal syndicalism law.

During the Banks-Pugh turmoil, Banks and some of his ardent lieutenants were charged with this crime, but later dismissed.

Pugh was indicted for alleged possession and attempted sale of communist literature, following his arrest last September on the Pacific highway near Central Point, by the state police. Pugh was traveling in a donkey-drawn cart, with a banner said to advocate "a workers' revolt."

The authorities assert that the communist literature seized in Pugh's possession advocated the overthrow of the American form of government.

Pugh will be represented by Attorney Irwin Goodman of Postland, who will arrive tomorrow for the trial.

Pugh has been held in the county jail since his arrest, in lieu of \$1500 bail. A number of written demands for his release have been received by the court and the district attorney's office, from northwest organizations of the "Workers and Farmers' Union."

Homing Bull Frog Hops Six Miles To Reach Old Haunts

MYSTIC, Conn. (UP)—Ever hear of a "homing" bullfrog? A resident here found a frog in his spring and threw it in a brook about 200 yards away. Next day the frog was back. He took it to another brook a quarter-mile away and two days later the frog was back again.

Scarcely believing it could be the same frog, the man marked it and carried it two miles to another brook. It took the frog a week to get back this time. A fourth trip to a brook five miles away had the same result—10 days for the return trip. In a final attempt to get rid of the amphibian, the distance was increased to six miles, in an adjoining town. Just 14 days later the frog hopped into the spring and there he stayed.
