

KYLE PUGH TRIAL GETS UNDER WAY IN CIRCUIT COURT

Trial of Kyle Pugh, indicted by the last grand jury on a charge of criminal syndicalism, was underway in circuit court today. Selection of a jury was started this morning, following the overruling of a defense motion asserting that separate acts were listed in the indictment, and demanding that the state select the one upon which they desired Pugh to be tried.

Pugh is charged with "the possession, distribution, sale and public display of literature" advocating "force, violence, crime and revolution" to bring about "political changes." Pugh was arrested last September in the Pacific highway near Central Point, by state police. He was traveling in a donkey-drawn cart. Communitist literature and pamphlets found in Pugh's possession are expected to be introduced as documentary evidence.

Since Pugh's incarceration in the county jail, the district attorney and circuit judge have received resolutions from "The Farmers' and Workers' Union in this state, Washington and Alaska, asking dismissal of the charge and release of Pugh.

Pugh is prosecuted under the 1933 Oregon law against criminal syndicalism. It is the first criminal syndicalism case in the history of Jackson county. Pugh is represented by Attorney Irwin Goodman of Portland; the state by District Attorney George A. Codding.

V. F. W. WILL ENLIST OVERSEAS VETS IN DRIVE FOR BONUS

Every overseas veteran in this city and vicinity will be invited personally to membership in the Veterans of Foreign Wars of the United States in conjunction with the nationwide "bonus mobilization" of that organization.

Plans for the local recruiting campaign were announced by Commander E. W. Wall, post No. 1833, V. F. W., at a meeting at the Armory.

In anticipation of the convening of congress January 3, when the bonus issue is expected to be one of the first major proposals of the session, the national V. F. W. will launch the most intensive membership campaign in its history, according to Commander Wall.

"The Veterans of Foreign Wars of the United States has led the fight for immediate payment of adjusted service certificates for the past several years," Commander Wall said. "We recently have been joined in these efforts by the American Legion and we also are winning increasing public and press support throughout the country in behalf of the discharge of this national debt to the World War service men.

"Victory for the bonus measure is actually in sight this winter. The only thing that can defeat us is the lack of personal and active support on the part of every veteran concerned. We know that every veteran in the United States is with us in this fight. But we must have their active membership in order to emphasize the tremendous and united strength of the men to whom this money is due."

YUGOSLAV TROOPS IN FORAYS OVER HUNGARIAN LINE

Budapest, the capital and the largest, is only 66 miles away.

The invasion followed Yugoslavia's expulsion of thousands of Hungarians, who continued to come across the border today. The situation arose from the assassination of King Alexander of Yugoslavia at Marseille October 9.

Indignation High
Indignation was at a fever pitch in Hungarian border villages. Serb troops, wearing their emblem of a skull and crossbones, shouted threats and imprecations at Hungarians, authorities reported.

Scared and nearby towns were filled to overflowing with weary and frightened refugees. Increasing the fear was the knowledge that Yugoslav forces are far superior to Hungarian troops along the frontier.

Many of the refugees were so ill they required hospital treatment. Four hundred were added last night to the 1308 who had arrived yesterday and the preceding night. Another refugee train was expected. The emigres told stories of mistreatment at the hands of Yugoslavs. Some said they were forced to leave behind much personal property.

Heavy guards of police were kept last night about the schools where the refugees slept.

Plaintive wails of children, suffering from the cold, mingled with the sobs of men as the first thousand refugees spent last night on beds of straw and leaves. A Hungarian tradition regards it as a weakness for a man to weep at a funeral, but these men cried unrestrainedly over the loss of their homes.

Many Hungarians apparently were not given time to get conveyances to carry their furniture beyond the frontier. They were taken to the local railroad stations under guard and bundled into freight trains for transportation over the border.

Serbs Seek Fight
The Serb detachment of Yugoslav soldiers entered Hungary only three miles from here and challenged a Hungarian border force to fight.

Only strong disciplinary action by Hungarian officers, they reported, prevented a battle.

The situation was tense and grave fears were expressed by authorities. Szege officials said they did not believe an attack on the city was contemplated but if it came the city was prepared. Streets were crowded with Hungarian soldiers.

(Szege, with a population of 135,000, is Hungary's second largest city.)
