**5-YEAR-OLD BOY IS HERO OF FIRE**  
WILLITS, Cal., Dec. 7.—(P)—The heroic story of how a five-year-old boy, locked alone in a burning house with two younger sisters, fought desperately but unavailingly amid the flames to save the life of the smallest, a mere baby, after rescuing the older, was told here today.

**Neighbors found the 14-year-old Richard Graham, in tears, clutching his sister Lucille, three, in front of the smoldering remains of their home. From his almost incoherent babbling they were able to piece together his story. When the fire broke out, Richard broke a window and went for help. No one was in the road, so he returned to the house and led Lucille to safety.**

**Then he plunged back again into the flames after baby Mona Lee, one year old. His strength was unequal to the task of lifting her from her crib, and he was finally forced to flee for his own life.**
