TO URGE REVALUATION OF DOLLAR



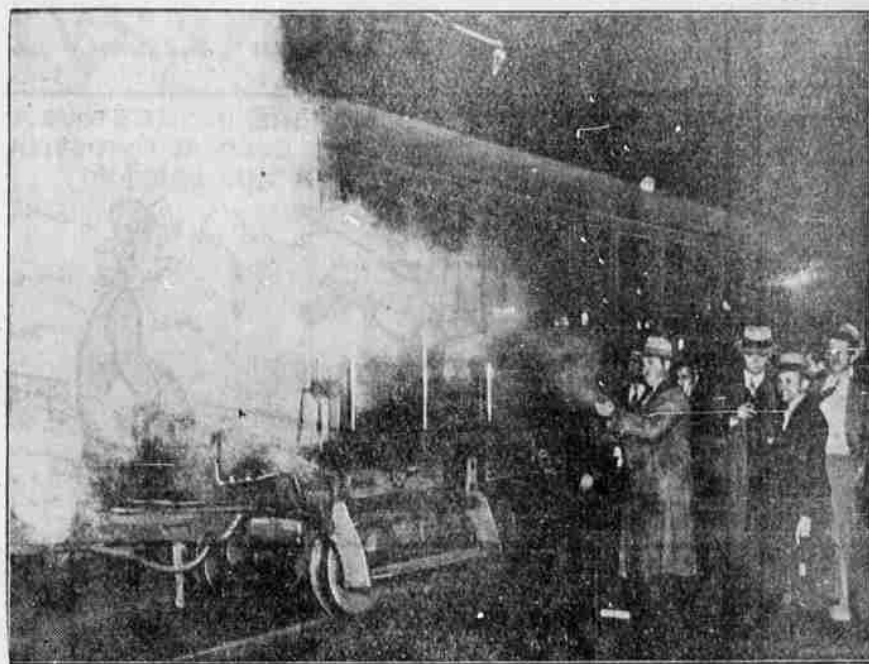

BACK HOME AND 'PRINCE-LESS'



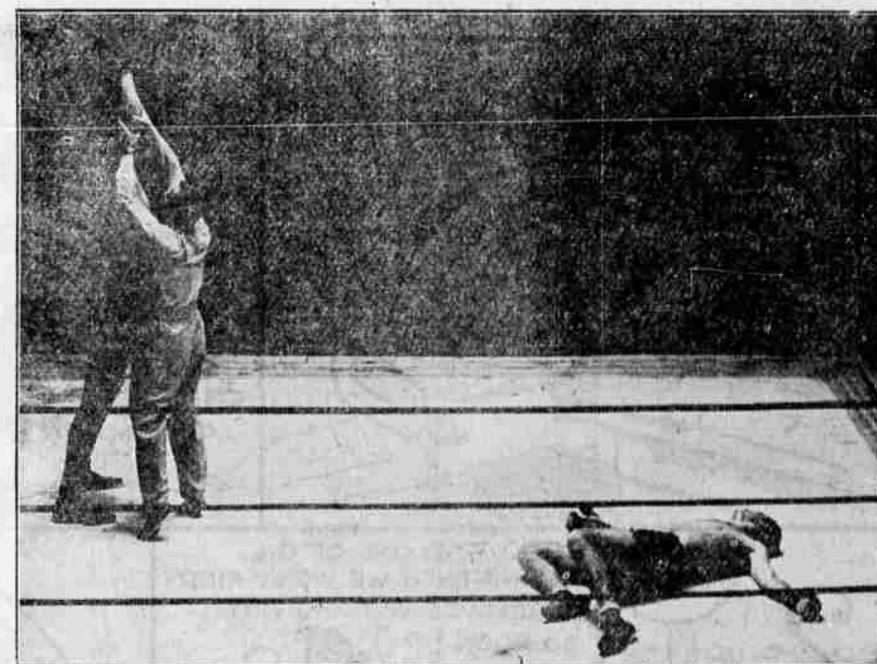

VETERANS IN CUBS-PIRATES TRADE



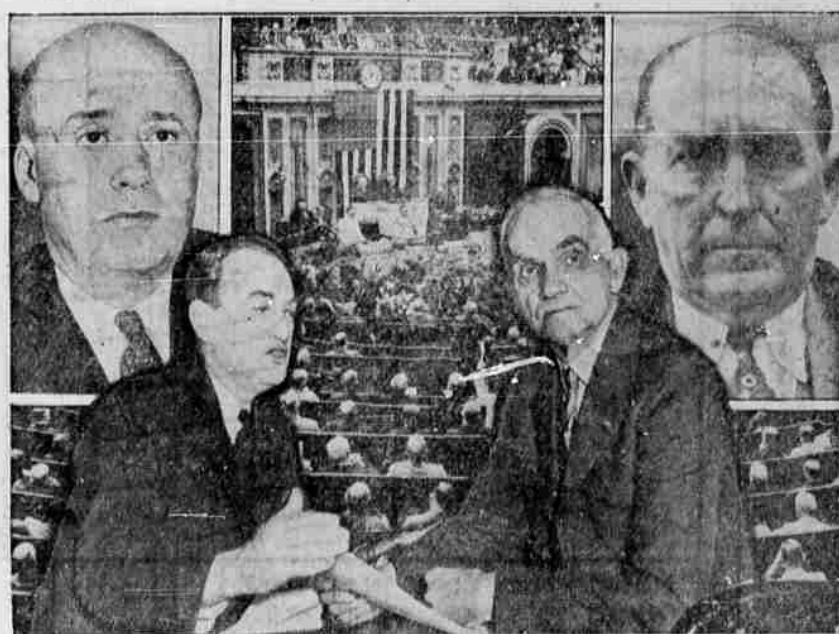
