PROSPERITY SEEN IN EAGLE POINT

Mrs. Will Brown of Eagle Point, member of the Eagle Point Civic Improvement club, was a Medford visitor Friday who expressed views that the Eagle Point vicinity is becoming one of the most prosperous in the county.

"Farmers in this vicinity have received many returns from the valley's turkey shipments this year," Mrs. Brown said, "which accounts for much of the upturn in business."

Mrs. Brown praised the schools in Eagle Point and said that the efficient corps of teachers consists of Professor Clarence Davis, Miss Yetta Olson and Mrs. Winslow in the high school, while Floyd Barrett, Mrs. Donna Earl and Miss Wilda Darnelle are the grade school teachers.

"The fine produce shipped from the Eagle Point cheese factory, owned and operated by A. Woodridge, is of great value to the community," Mrs. Brown said.

TEACHERS EXAMS SET FOR DEC. 19

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GIFT BOXES OF FRUIT GAINING POPULARITY BECAUSE OF DROUGHT

"Rogue River valley's marvelous fruit is more in demand for Christmas gifts this year than at any time in 1922," said Walter H. Jones Saturday. "This is probably due chiefly to the effects of drought over a vast area of the nation. Quality fruit is at a premium everywhere in the drought area and in many communities cannot be had at all, owing to unwillingness of merchants to stock anything except poorer grades because of drought enforced limitation of buying power."

"There has been an unusually heavy shipment of gift boxes of local fruit since the beginning of the year's packing season. The more local people ship fruit to friends and relatives in other states, the more they come to know and realize how much a gift of fruit is appreciated over gifts of merchandise which can be had anywhere. This is most fortunate for our community at this particular time as people from other states are thinking of moving here because of drought and summer heat do not destroy the fruits of labor."

"High quality of the 1934 crop and improved storage facilities here at Medford unite to make possible the freshness necessary to assure arrival of gift fruit in prime condition in the most distant points of the states or even in Alaska, Canada or Honolulu. Gift box shipments are mounting steadily and will peak at about a full carload per day beginning next week. It is a mighty help to people here in the community. Let's all send out of town relatives and friends gifts of Rogue River valley's finest fruits for Christmas."

After the winners are announced the food will become the property of the Phoenix Grange and will be sold at auction.
