

Note Dame Passing Attack Nets 14 to 0 Victory Over Trojans

YOUNGER BROTHER OF COACH LAYDEN IS POINT MAKER

Notre Dame Halts Troy One Inch From Goal Line—Irish Excel in Air—All Scoring in Second Period

MEMORIAL COLISEUM, LOS ANGELES, Dec. 8.—(AP)—The Laydens had it as Notre Dame defeated Southern California 14 to 0, before approximately 50,000 spectators today.

Elmer sat on the bench as Coach Layden made the touchdowns. Ten years ago Southern California last saw Elmer in action as he dashed about the rose bowl intercepting Stanford's passes. Today the younger brother scored both the Irish counters against the fighting Trojans and playing a great defensive game as well.

Frank was all over the huge coliseum today but the most important location he picked out was a spot 21 yards from the Trojans' goal in the first period when the score was nothing to nothing. He was there when a long pass from Bill Shakespeare came down and after he caught it, there was no trouble about sprinting across for the score. In the second period he played over from the two yard line after Wayne Milner had made a sensational catch of a pass on the rebound. This time Andy Pilney was the pitcher.

The home team never was able to keep up with the visitors' passing attack. Twelve times the Irish tossed the ball and four were completed for a total of 112 yards. In 11 overhead efforts the Trojans were able to connect with only 3 for a puny total of 24 yards. The Irish with a late spurt also took the lead in rushing 144 yards to 109. Until the day was almost done, the Trojans had more yards thru the rushing game than the Irish. The losers did wind up with a slight edge in first downs, eight to seven.

The victory gave Notre Dame the edge in the nine games played, five to four.

Southern California had one great chance to score but the sturdy forward wall of the boys from South Bend stopped the drive just down and Notre Dame took the ball and kicked out. The Trojans were down on the Notre Dame 20-yard line, as a result of a recovered fumble, when this push started. Earlier in the game, almost at the start, another recovered fumble gave the home team the ball in the visitors' territory and a smart drive for a few plays took the Trojans to the Notre Dame 13 where it was stopped and a try for field goal failed.

All the scoring was done in the first two periods. Southern California came out after the intermission with a greatly improved defense and kept the Irish around midfield most of the time.

Coach Layden gave most of his squad a chance to play a white, twice sending in substitutes in wholesale lots, eleven at a time.

SOUTH METHODIST VICTORS IN SNOW

ST. LOUIS, Dec. 8.—(AP)—Southern Methodist University's aerial stunters struck swiftly today for a second period touchdown, then held off Washington University's equally air-minded Bears to score a 7-0 victory on a snow-coated gridiron.

Approximately 6,000 shivering fans watched the game, played for the benefit of the St. Louis Boys' club, a Catholic character-building organization.

Just before the end of the second period, Bobby Wilson, 180-pound sparkplug of the Mustangs' attack, who had just entered the game, hurled a 14-yard pass to Louis Smith, who stood in the end zone. Maurice Orr place-kicked the extra point.

NEW RATING FOR STEELHEAD URGED

ROSEBURG, Ore., Dec. 8.—(AP)—A resolution urging the Oregon legislature at its forthcoming session to adopt a bill declaring the steelhead a game fish to protect it from commercial netting, was adopted by the Roseburg Rod and Gun club at its regular meeting here last night. The club also went on record as opposing the suggested one-man game commission, and favored the organization of the five-man committee with three members from western and two from eastern Oregon. A letter of commendation to the game commission was authorized, expressing appreciation for improvements in hatcheries, bird and fish restocking in fields and streams of Douglas county, and the work of the engineering department in building fishways over natural barriers in the South Umpqua river and Steamboat creek.

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 8.—(AP)—St. Mary's Gaels and University of St. Francisco's Dons, who have worked up one of the bitterest of football rivalries in an eight year period, will clash here tomorrow in the concluding collegiate game of the season.

More than 30,000 fans are expected to sit in on the annual battle between Coach Ed Madigan's team, winding up an "in and out" season, and the eleven Spud Lewis has coached into the strongest ever to represent San Francisco.

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DICKINSON RATES MINNESOTA FIRST; STANFORD NO. 10

Pittsburg Placed Second, Columbia Third, and Alabama Sixth—Gophers Listed As Nation's Best

CHICAGO, Dec. 8.—(AP)—Minnesota's great eleven today was ranked as the country's best college football team under the system of rating originated by Prof. Frank G. Dickinson of the University of Illinois.

The mighty men of the north are ranked at the top in spite of the fact that Pittsburg had a higher "point" rating under the system. Minnesota wins the honor, and possession for one year of the Knute K. Rockne memorial trophy, sponsored by the late Notre Dame wizard's "four horsemen." Elmer Layden, James Crowler, Harry Strubel and Don Miller, Minnesota qualifies under a section of Prof. Dickinson's code, which provides that an undefeated team is ranked above a team that had been defeated, regardless of the point standing.

Minnesota had a point rating of 23.52. Pittsburg's ranking was 24.19, due, Prof. Dickinson said, to the fact that Pittsburg played a more difficult schedule than Minnesota. Columbia placed third with 23.00, and Illinois, ranked even with Minnesota in Prof. Dickinson's big ten standing, was fourth with 22.01.

Alabama and Stanford, which meet in the annual Rose Bowl Battle New Year's day, are ranked sixth and tenth, respectively.

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OREGON GRIDSTERS TAKE TRAIN FOR LOUISIANA GAME

EUGENE, Ore., Dec. 8.—(AP)—The University of Oregon football squad left tonight on a 2,000-mile haul to meet Louisiana State University, Kingfish Huey Long's team, at Baton Rouge, La., next Saturday.

Two years ago the two teams met there and the Oregon Webfoots' cleats clattered over a frozen field in near-zero weather for a 12-to-0 Oregon win.

This year the Oregon team is a smooth-working unit with plenty of power in the starting lineup, but minus the reserve power of former years.

The Webfoots worked out here this afternoon and planned several workouts en route. They will stop briefly at Los Angeles, El Paso and San Antonio, Texas. Two final practices will be held on Tulane university's field at New Orleans Thursday and Friday.

Plays scouted from Louisiana played Eugene last Saturday were observed today for the first time by the Oregon squad.

OHIO GOLF STAR TOPS FAST FIELD ON MIAMI LINKS

MIAMI, Fla., Dec. 8.—(AP)—Turning back the threats of goldfom's great, Leonard Schmutte of Findlay, Ohio, who has not competed in a golf tournament in two years, conquered a cold wind today to post a 72, one over par, and lead the field at the end of the first 18 holes of play in the \$12,500 Miami Biltmore open.

The curly haired middle westerner chalked up a 35-37 to top 145 players representing approximately half the field.

Par for the 6,640-yard course is 71. Schmutte finished the opening day one stroke ahead of Gene Kunes, Norristown, Pa., pro, from the first or bombing squadron.

The latter division is composed of players who finished among the low 60's and ties in the recent national open.

A purse of \$7,200 has been posted for the big shots in the bombing squadron, with the top prize \$2,500, while \$500 awards the pursuit squadron, with high award of \$100 for first place.

Tied with 73 with Kunes, who posted a 35-38, were James Fassezka of Jackson, Mich., with 34-39, and Mike Tureasa of Elmford, N. Y., with 37-36.

RADIO BROADCAST MAIN ITEM COAST CONFERENCE MEET

PALM SPRINGS, Calif., Dec. 8.—(AP)—Athletic officials of the Pacific coast conference were to gather here tomorrow for their annual winter meeting Monday and Tuesday to solve problems growing out of the football season just closed.

The chief item of business was expected to be a renewed discussion of radio broadcasting of grid contests with the prospect good that it would be continued on the same basis of recent years.

Revision and approval of 1935 football schedules draws up a year ago also was to occupy considerable attention, with several outstanding changes to be made. In this connection it was reliably reported that Washington State would be dropped from the list of Southern California opponents for next year.

BELCASTRO READY TO MEET SAVOLDI

After meeting and beating Red Devil, huge mystery man, Pete Belcastro is waiting to meet "Jumping Joe" Savoldi, famous originator of the drop-kick who issued a challenge to the winner, with confidence that he stands a good chance of taking the match.

Promoter Mack Lillard said last night that Pete believes his drop-kick to be as good or better than that used by the Italian, and that if he doesn't get a chance to use it, he will give Savoldi some of the rough treatment with which he kicked off the Red Devil into the third row of spectators.

EX-OREGON GRID STARS RULED OUT MID-WEST PLAY

CHICAGO, Dec. 8.—(AP) Five players on Minnesota's championship football team were automatically barred from further competition with the Gophers today when the Big Ten faculty committee reaffirmed the freshman rule.

Players affected by the rule are Stan Koska, fullback; Art Clarkson, halfback; George Svendsen, center; Vernon Oech, guard, and Bill Bevan, guard.

Under Big Ten rules no player is permitted more than three seasons of competition in athletics. If any player attends a non-conference school and plays on a freshman team that engages in a regular schedule of games with an outside school such competition is counted as one of the three allowed years.

The histories of the four most important players involved today are: Koska and Clarkson: Played one season on the freshman team and one on the varsity at University of Oregon. Played one year on Minnesota varsity.

Svendsen: Played one season on freshman team at University of Oregon, two seasons on Minnesota varsity.

Bevan: One season on Oregon State freshman team, two seasons on Minnesota varsity.

War on Slot Machines
PENDLETON, Ore., Dec. 8.—(AP)—Pendleton Ministerial association last night demanded of the city council that it start clamping down in the near future on gambling card games and slot machines in Pendleton. Through its president, Rev. Ralph Hinkle, the association declared that unless immediate action is taken, the group plans to collect evidence and will make a final fight of the problem.

HONOLULU SQUAD STILL SILENT ON GRID GAME HERE

C. G. Smith, acting school superintendent, yesterday had received no word from officials of McKinley high school of Honolulu, T. H., in answer to a wire sent him last week proposing a football game to be played in this city with Medford high school.

As an answer was expected Saturday, Smith believes officials of the Hawaiian team, which is scheduled to play a high school at Los Angeles on Christmas, are making a consideration of the proposal. He said a message will probably be received from Los Angeles Monday.

In order to prevent considerable expense, Smith has not yet approached the state athletic board regarding the game, which, if scheduled, would be played on Van Scoyoc field the latter part of this month. Final permission from the board would be obtained after an agreement is reached.

The Tiger eleven is anxiously awaiting the message, Smith said, and if the game is agreed upon, will be put into training immediately to be in shape for the post season contest.

GRANGE ENDS HIS GRID PLAYING IN PRO GAME TODAY

NEW YORK, Dec. 8.—(AP)—Professional football took its last long breath of the 1934 season tonight as the gridiron warriors of the champion Chicago Bears and the New York Giants beared in for their climatic struggle for the national league championship with a crowd of 85,000 in prospect.

The bruising Bears, averaging 217 pounds and with a record of 13 consecutive league victories, including 27-7 and 10-9 triumphs over the Giants, are outstanding betting favorites at odds ranging from 3 to 1 to 2 to 1.

"Red" Grange, the former "galloping ghost" of Illinois, who will be closing out his career as a league player tomorrow, performed in practice today in the role of Ken Strong, the Giants' punting, passing and kicking halfback, and made surprising gains against his mates.

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
