that other "dehorners" might have taken to their rooms after drinking some of the poisonous fluid and then become too ill to summon aid.

Captain of Detectives John Keegan said today: "This 'dehorn' business must stop and now is the time to push it through. I'm going through the statements we have taken from the victims and they will be the basis for our action."

Would Fix Responsibility Captain Keegan tried to determine whether any of the alcohol vendors sold the fluid to persons they knew were "dehorn" addicts. It is illegal to sell denatured alcohol for purposes other than drinking.

Full responsibility for the large number of deaths will be fixed if such action is at all possible, according to Mayor Carson, who said: "Every person found to have furnished or sold any of the products responsible for the deaths will be apprehended immediately and prosecuted—we'll do the talking afterwards."

Four deaths Sunday, and one today, were attributed to "dehorn" alcohol brought the total number of fatalities here to twenty-one for the three days. Most of the victims had police records and were known to be addicted to the use of denatured alcohol.

A statement issued by Oregon Pharmaceutical leaders "condemned in the strongest terms" the sale of denatured alcohol to any person who may be suspected of using it as a beverage.

and other fraternal organizations of the city and county were scheduled to take similar action today.

Dozens of petitions, protesting against granting a parole to E. H. Fehl, partner of Banks in the Jackson county agitation, were also dispatched yesterday to Salem. Fehl has served the minimum time of his sentence of four years for ballot-theft conspiracy. The petitions ask that should Fehl ever be granted release, a condition of his parole, be his return to Jackson county.

Word that Banks was seeking a pardon, came Saturday morning from Salem. The news galvanized citizens into action immediately. The state attorney-general's office took steps to protest the murderer's release, when the pardon petition is formally presented to the pardon board.

Under-Cover Campaign It seems a quiet move for the release of Banks, has been underway for several weeks. It consisted of sending a form letter to the governor, urging his freedom. The latter part of last week, a report was circulated in this city that "Banks is very sick and cannot live long." This rumor was denied by state prison officials, who reported Banks in usual good health.

Three or four weeks ago, Charles P. Moran, wealthy Cleveland, Ohio, resident and brother-in-law of Banks, arrived at Portland and Salem. According to reports received here, he contacted three upstate men close to Governor Meier, and the movement for a pardon was launched.

Mrs. Banks, according to Salem dispatches, has also been active in her mate's behalf, and expressed the belief he would be the recipient of a Christmas pardon. Governor Meier's term of office expires January 1, and proceedings are necessarily rushed for action before he retires to private life. Salem dispatches today also said that Moran had assured the governor that Banks, if released, would be taken to Ohio.

Banks, after participating as a moving spirit, in two years of strife that wracked this country, shot and killed Constable George A. Prescott about ten o'clock, on the morning of March 16, 1933, as Prescott stood at the door of the Banks home on West Main street. The constable came to serve a warrant upon Banks, following his indictment for ballot-theft. Banks had boasted he would kill anyone who sought to serve a warrant on him.

The shot was fired from a high-powered big game rifle, as Banks stood in the interior of his home, and his wife opened the door.

Following the killing, Banks was placed under arrest by the state police, and rushed to Grants Pass for safe-keeping. Mrs. Banks was also placed under arrest.

Tried in Lane County Banks and his wife went on trial in Lane county, May 2, 1933, charged with first degree murder. After a trial that lasted 21 days, Banks was found guilty of second degree murder. His wife was acquitted.

Banks' entry to state prison, to start serving the life sentence imposed by Judge G. F. Skipworth of Eugene, was delayed by an appeal to the state supreme court. He was finally taken to the penitentiary, August 9, 1933. During the interval between

passing of sentence and prison entry, complaints arose that Banks was receiving favors, which brought denial. The supreme court decided the appeal against Banks, and affirmed the lower court in every particular. Banks, in the fifteen months he has spent in the penitentiary, first served in the prison laundry, but several months ago was assigned to the prison library.

CRUISER TO RETURN CUBAN ENVOY'S BODY WASHINGTON, Dec. 10.—(AP)—A United States cruiser will carry the body of Dr. Manuel Marquez Sterling, Cuban ambassador, back to the country he served as provisional president and diplomat.

The veteran statesman-journalist died at the embassy yesterday at the age of 63. He had suffered from asthma for a long time.

Hop Convention Ends, SALEM, Dec. 10.—(AP)—The third annual convention of the Oregon Hop Growers' Association closed its one-day session here Saturday night, after voting in favor of making hops a national basic commodity, and the early adoption of the recently proposed marketing agreement for the industry.
