APPLEGATE DAM COMMITTEE WILL FOSTER PROJECT

Initial steps towards the securing of a storage dam reservoir in the Applegate district were taken Wednesday night at a meeting of Applegate residents, held in the Ruch schoolhouse.

A committee composed of Edwin Taylor, T. M. Rowden, and Frank Preston was named to report at a future meeting on the best mode of procedure, and what steps were necessary to start Miles Cantrell of Ruch acted as chairman of the meeting, with William N. Carl as secretary.

Another meeting for the same purpose to further discuss the dam plan has been called for next Wednesday at the Ruch school at 8 p. m.

It is now tentatively proposed to erect the proposed dam at what is called "the Pat Wayne site" in the upper Applegate. Other sites are under consideration.

Lester Smith told the meeting that with a dam 90 to 100 feet high, 20,000 acre feet of water could be stored.

Other speakers said that a storage dam, as proposed, would provide plenty of irrigation water for all, and end irrigation troubles of the district.

The plan has been under discussion for several years in the Applegate, but the present movement is the first time it has taken definite form.

PROHIBITION ADVOCATE WILL TALK SUNDAY AT FIRST BAPTIST CHURCH

Hon. Oliver W. Stewart of Chicago, president of the Flying Squadron Foundation, will speak in the First Baptist church here Sunday at 7:30 p. m.

Mr. Stewart's subject will be "The Oncoming War With the Liquor Traffic." He will discuss the many phases of the drink problem, meeting the war arguments at every turn. His many years of experience give him the background for this work.

His services in the legislature in the state of Illinois, to the house of which he was elected in Chicago as a dry, attracted far more than state-wide attention. He is known throughout the country for his sanity in the presentation of the problem of the liquor traffic.

Mr. Stewart has recently completed

a state-wide campaign in Minnesota, where the drys made a satisfactory showing in the primary. He also spent a month in West Virginia and five weeks in Kansas in a campaign to maintain the state's prohibition amendment.

He is coming to the state for a series of meetings in the interest of prohibition. The public is invited. Admission free.

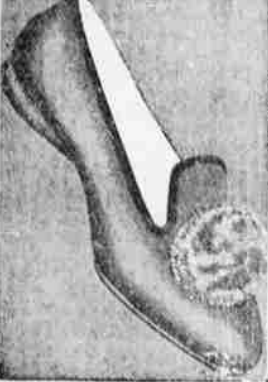

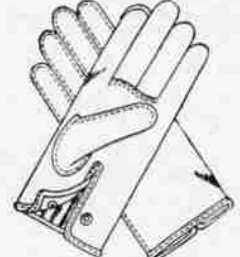

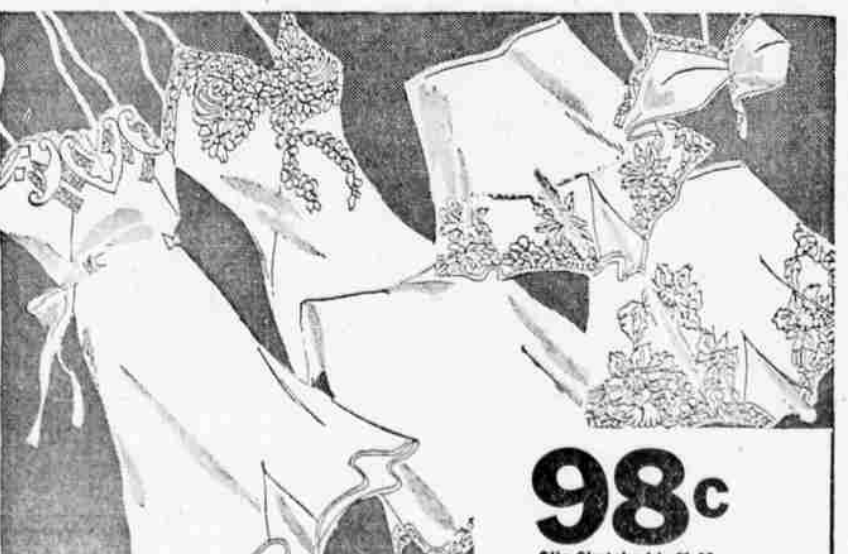
