

Louisiana State Shades Oregon 14 to 13, in Last Half Scoring

PASS INSTEAD OF KICK FOR EXTRA POINT IS COSTLY

Callison Squad Unable to Hold Two Touchdown Lead at Half — Oregon Flashes Power, and Air Attack.

BATON ROUGE, La., Dec. 15.—(AP)—Snapping back with scoring thrusts after being outclassed for nearly half the game, Louisiana State university's gridmen overcame a two-touchdown lead today to defeat Oregon 14 to 13.

The accurate extra-point kicking of Ernie Seago, plus an Oregon decision that put misjudged faith in a pass instead of a kick for conversion, directly accounted for Louisiana's triumph.

From the first play until the middle of the second quarter the Louisianaans were subjected to a power battering and a dazzling air attack that made them look bad.

Oregon's emerald-jerseyed warriors, playing smart, fast football, and led by the dashing backs Mischek and Van Vliet, hammered and passed two touchdowns in the first and second periods to lead 8-0, 13-0.

After the first touchdown, which came when Mischek skidded around left end for three yards after an all bombardment, Line smashes put the ball in striking range, the Webbs tried to pass for the extra point instead of kicking.

A pass by Van Vliet fell dead behind the goal.

Early in the second period Van Vliet, as if to make up for the missed point, broke through left guard and the Louisiana 25-yard line and dodged State tacklers to the goal. This time Walker, substitute end, kicked the point.

Then Captain "Biff" Jones, State coach, after sending in his reserves, who kept the Oregonians at bay for a while, gave his first stringers some bench pointers and shot them back in. From then on it was a different game.

Mischek began slipping passes to Barrett, L. S. U. end and crack receiver, and worked the ball to the 4-yard line. From there Mischek slipped a flat one to Barrett over the goal. Seago converted.

With the game end nearing, and with Mischek out, Fatherree tore around left end for 59 yards and a touchdown that knotted the count.

Seago came through with an extra point, and the game was won.

Oregon had the better of it in first downs, 14 to 12.

SAVOLDI VICTOR WHEN PETE HURLS SELF THRU ROPES

Muir started tossing the Demon with body slams and on the third slam Red Demon rolled over on top of him and Referee Frisbie awarded him the fall and the match.

On the sound of the gong in the main bout, Savoldi came in fast and flew first at Belcastro and Belcastro ducked. Belcastro took a kick at the ex-Notre Dame football star and missed. Savoldi took another boot at Belcastro but Belcastro again ducked and plunged headlong with his feet at the football star's chin and flattened him. Belcastro jumped and pressed Savoldi's shoulder to the mat for the first fall. It took 15 seconds.

Both men resorted to the finer points in the second round and after 13 minutes started in on the modern methods and both landed on their necks outside the ring. Belcastro came to first and climbed back into the ring to await the arrival of his opponent. Savoldi got inside the ring and Belcastro cut loose with his knockout drop-kick but Joe ducked and sent Belcastro right on through the ropes. He didn't come back.

Belcastro weighed in at 192 and Savoldi at 203.

BLACK CLOUD ON FISTIC HORIZON BATTERS RAMAGE

CHICAGO, Dec. 15.—(AP)—He may not turn out to be another Jack Johnson, but Joe Louis, a dynamite-fisted negro from Detroit looks like just what the ailing heavyweight boxing business needs.

This dark cloud, with a silver lining in the way of increased public interest in the big division, surmounted the first critical test of his six month professional career by scoring a spectacular eighth round technical knockout triumph over Lee Ramage of San Diego, Cal., in the Chicago stadium Friday night. Only 20 years old, weighing 194½ pounds and still growing, Louis socked his way into the front ranks of the division by the victory.

Ramage, a better than ordinary boxer, worked up a slight lead in points during the first seven rounds. During the first minute of the eighth round a left hook jarred Ramage, and before he could get his feet again, a right cross to the chin sent him down for a nine count. He arose and another right floored him for nine. As he struggled to his feet, Louis again sent his right crashing against Ramage's chin.

Ramage managed to regain his feet at "nine," but before Louis could deliver another right a towel fluttered out from the Californian's corner and Referee Phil Collins stopped the fight after two minutes 15 seconds of the round. Ramage weighed 182½, eleven less than Louis.

CALLAND RESIGNS IDAHO GRID JOB

MOSCOW, Idaho, Dec. 15.—(AP)—Leo Calland, for six years football coach and director of athletics at the University of Idaho, telegraphed his resignation, without explanation, today to President M. G. Neale, of the university.

Calland wired the one-sentence resignation from Riverside, Calif., where he went after the meeting of Pacific coast conference coaches and graduate managers this week. The telegram follows: "I hereby tender my resignation as director of athletics and football coach at the University of Idaho, effective September 1, 1935."

Dr. Neale declined to comment. He said, however, that he would present the resignation at the meeting of the board of regents of the university at Boise Monday.

Calland, one of the greatest guards ever developed at the University of Southern California, came to Idaho in February, 1929, after having been freshman football and varsity basketball coach at Southern California. He was given a three-year contract. In January, 1932, he was given another three-year contract.
