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APPLAGATE DAM BOOSTERS HOPE FOR U. S. FUNDS

BIG APPLAGATE, Dec. 17.-(AP)-Realizing the possibility of a vastly improved irrigation system for the Applegate valley by means of a large reservoir at the Barr ranch below Copper, which would supply water for 26,000 acres of land, farmers here are formulating plans to secure federal funds for the irrigation project.

A committee consisting of E. H. Taylor, chairman, T. M. Rowden, and Frank C. Preston, appointed this week, will investigate the method of procedure to perfect an organization assuming such an undertaking. The committee was appointed by Miles Cantrell, who presided at an assembly of 35 farmers at Barr Wednesday, at which W. N. (Rucker Hill) Carl served as secretary.

A dam 80 or 100 feet high in the Big Applegate valley would furnish a normal supply of water during the summer to irrigate the 17,000 acres in the valley already possessing water rights, according to the opinion of Lester Smith of the county engineer's office, who was present at the meeting Wednesday. Mr. Smith, who has based his ideas of the project on a few calculations made at the proposed dam site, said that an additional ten feet on the dam would supply the approximate 10,000 acres now unirrigated, which would be reached by a high line ditch extending to Missouri Flat or beyond.

A 100 foot dam would back the river to the Garbury bridge, a distance of 3.7 miles, and would store 30,000 acre feet of water, an acre foot covering one acre of land to a depth of one foot, the engineer said.

Less than \$300,000 would build the structure, it is believed. The possibility of a power plant, which would generate 10,000 horsepower electricity, also was pointed out.

The beneficial results of damming the Applegate at the Barr ranch has been considered by the local residents for 10 or 12 years and with the government's readiness to finance such projects at the present time, farmers feel that their opportunity has arrived. With the river banks narrowing to a deep gorge at the proposed site, the danger is not to be excused for storage purposes, and since the Applegate runs a fair stream of water even during dry seasons, it is believed that the proposed plan will succeed.

Farmers of the valley are expected to organize as a unit in launching the plan, and the next meeting will be held at the Applegate hall Wednesday evening, Dec. 19. The committee will report their plans at that time.
