MURDER SUSPECT ADMITS ROBBERY PORTLAND HOMES

PORTLAND, Ore., Dec. 18.—(AP)—While police and the district attorney's office moved today to consolidate and coordinate evidence against Joseph Osbourne, 24, a special policeman accused of murdering an elderly merchant, city officials laid plans for stricter regulation of the personnel and activities of all other special officers.

Osbourne, said by Captain of Detectives Keegan to have admitted many robberies from automobiles and homes he was supposed to have been protecting, will enter a plea tomorrow to a charge of first degree murder. He is accused of having beaten to death Simon Mish, 70, in the latter's home a week ago. Police believe they have enough circumstantial evidence to warrant his being bound over to the grand jury.

Meanwhile Chief of Police Niles ordered a searching investigation of the ranks of special police. "I am not accusing every special patrolman of being a thief," the chief said. "Most of them are honest and able men and do excellent work, but the case of Osbourne proves there may be other thieves in the group."

"Pumping oil to the windward of the Sisto. Any vessel with oil please communicate. Have been unable to get wireless reports from the Sisto for one hour.

"Weather had. Approximate position latitude 49 degrees, 10 minutes north, longitude, 23 degrees, 22 minutes west."
