WASHINGTON, Dec. 19.—(AP) Official and medical investigation learned with regret today of the death of Mrs. Mary Harriman Rumsey, chairman of the NRA consumers' advisory board and Junior League founder.

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That was the report given today by Dr. Ross T. McIntire, naval physician in constant attendance on Mr. Roosevelt since he took office.

"I don't suppose there is any man in the country who follows a routine more closely than does Mr. Roosevelt," he added.

"We don't have to worry much about him. About twice a year we check him over. No, we don't worry much because he is so good about coming to us when he is feeling a little off."

The day of the president, who will be 53 next January 30, usually runs like this:

Up at 8:30 and breakfast in bed; goes to the executive offices about 10:30, where he remains until between 5:30 and 6; swims and exercises for about an hour and a quarter; rests until dinner at 7:45; retires between 10:30 and 11.

After retiring to his quarters, he finishes up odds and ends left over the day. If there is time, the stamp album is taken out. Stamps are his hobby.

Mr. Roosevelt weighs in the 80's. His weight, Dr. McIntire said, doesn't vary more than four pounds a year.

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MRS. MARY RUMSEY, PHILANTHROPIST AND SPORTSWOMAN, DIES

WASHINGTON, Dec. 19.—(AP) Official and medical investigation learned with regret today of the death of Mrs. Mary Harriman Rumsey, chairman of the NRA consumers' advisory board and Junior League founder.

The widowed philanthropist and sportswoman died last night of injuries suffered when her horse fell during a fox hunt in Virginia several weeks ago.

After funeral services at St. Thomas Episcopal church here this afternoon the body will be taken to Arden, N. Y., for burial Thursday.

The daughter of Edward Henry Harriman, New York railway magnate, she had long been nationally known for her Junior League organization and other philanthropic undertakings. She was noted also as a patron of the arts and former owner of a southern newspaper chain.

She was an organizer of the Eastern Livestock Co-operative association, helped develop the Emergency Exchange association and was formerly a director of the American Farm foundation.

Her appointment to the NRA board last year was one of the early selections of women for high places in the new deal setup.

Her job, with Prof. William F. Ogburn, economist, was to find out how the consumers were faring under NRA code operation. They soon differed, though, over a set of recommendations Ogburn proposed. Ogburn finally resigned and Mrs. Rumsey headed the consumers' unit until her death.

RYTHM CHEWING HINT FOR BEAUTY

Models Told How Exercise Aids in Retaining Facial Charm.

NEW YORK, Dec. 17.—Chewing gum as a beauty aid was recommended to 2,000 professional models, members of the Model's Guild, by a New York beauty specialist, today. In response to a letter from the Guild requesting information on the new beauty system, which was said to be causing much comment, the expert

told of the success of rhythmic chewing exercises in promoting facial charm.

"The secret of beauty," says the report, "is to keep the muscles of the face and neck young and firm through exercise. Chewing is nature's own way of supplying that much-needed stimulation at mealtimes. But foods of today are too soft and require too little chewing to give nature a chance."

"So, if you would have a swan-like neck, a chin that outtrails Helen of Troy and a mouth and lips too ravishing for description, chew gum. Accompany the chewing with rhythmic exercises which give tone to all the muscles of the face and neck."

"Doctors and dentists have long known that chewing-gum was a

real benefit to civilized people, but only recently has the beauty angle been recognized."

To provide the toning necessary for active, responsive muscles, specialists have created a series of simple exercises. The instructions for one of them: "Take one or two sticks of gum and start to chew. After a few seconds, begin with the head at center, and on four counts turn it sharply to the left, back to center, sharply to the right and back to center, chewing rhythmically, once on each count."

This exercise is said to firm the muscles of the neck and at the same time to provide stimulation for the inner muscles of the lower jaw. Other exercises in the system develop the cheeks and the muscles around the eyes.

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ROOSEVELT READY TO FINANCE CITIES IN PRODUCING POWER

Water in Holding Companies. The president said the overwhelming proportion of utility stocks and bonds are as sound as government bonds.

The water in utility financial structure, he said, is in the holding companies. Therefore, Mr. Roosevelt said he felt it was belounging the issue to lump all utility stocks and bonds into the same category.

It was emphasized the administration is determined to go ahead with its campaign for cheaper power.

The companies whose bids were rejected by New York City were members of the Edison Institute.

Steel Peace Hoped. Mr. Roosevelt said he was hopeful of an early agreement within the steel industry on the new proposal for peace in the industry.

The three point plan for maintenance of peace was not disclosed pending further talks between employers and employees.

There is no specific time element involved in reaching the agreement. Senator Norris (R., Neb.), advocate of municipal ownership, was elated over the president's power assertion.

He said the executive already had the authority under existing public works laws to loan money for construction of municipal power plants, but the fund was almost exhausted.

"I don't think this is a bluff either," Norris added. "I think the president really means what he said."

In response to inquiries, the president commented on a proposal of the Edison Electric Institute for a test of the constitutionality of the federal power program.

The proposal that the government join in a test of the legality was rejected by an administration spokesman.

SLOT MACHINE HEARING POSTPONED BY COURT

Hearing on the charge, growing out of the alleged operation of a slot machine, in the Pine Cone, a north Pacific highway resort, has been postponed by Justice of the Peace W. R. Coleman, until all three defendants named in the complaint are able to appear in court.

The machine was seized by the sheriff's office last week. M. O. Bissonette, Earl Simms, and E. M. Bush, are named as defendants. They are specifically charged with the "maintenance and operation of a nickel-in-the-slot-machine."

Bush resides in Marshfield, Ore., and has been notified of the charge. Simms has entered a plea of not guilty.

Sheriff Olmscheid has served notice that slot machines operating in the county, are subject to confiscation.

RENTED CAPITOL SERVED OREGON IN EARLY DAYS

Basement Rooms in Old School Building Occupied by Legislature Session in Year of 1854-55.

SALEM, Ore.—(UP)—Oregon's government carried on in rented quarters in the early days of the territory and state, not as a matter of political bickering but as a necessity.

For over 25 years, after the capital was located at Salem, rented offices were occupied here, as they had been previously at Oregon City, beginning in 1844, throughout the years of the provisional government. The state afforded no buildings of its own at that time.

Solons in Basement. The first rented rooms occupied by the territorial government were in the building of the Oregon Institute, which later became Willamette university. Basement rooms of the school were utilized by the legislatures of 1851-1852 and 1852-1853.

The legislature of 1854-1855 held its sessions in unfinished rooms of the territorial capitol, beginning the first Monday in December, 1854, but a year later, the night of December 20, the territorial capitol was burned to the ground and the legislature was forced to finish its session in the Rector building.

The Holman building was ready for occupancy by the territorial legislature of 1857-1858 the first Monday in December, 1857. The family for whom it was named was not the same one as that of Rufus C. Holman, state treasurer, who seeks to utilize the Mulkey building in Portland as a state office building.

BRITISH PLANNING TURRETED PLANES

LONDON.—(AP)—England has ordered a dozen new turreted gun-planes that she says will "blow any invading aircraft out of the sky."

Long-range biplanes, the new monsters, will be equipped with a turret similar to that of a battleship. Experts say it entirely eliminates difficulties of gun operation, making maneuverability from a plane moving at 200 miles an hour as accurate as from a fixed base.

A comparatively heavy gun may be used, one capable of destroying enemy aircraft with a single shot. A secret invention takes care of the recoil.

The turret is placed on the front tip of the fuselage, between two motors. The seated gunner is called upon for almost no physical effort. All he has to do is point the gun, and the turret mechanism does the rest, swinging around to bear upon the target.
