COUNTY OFFICIALS FOR LUXURY TAX TO PAY PENSIONS

PORTLAND, Dec. 19.—(AP)—Although Governor-elect Martin yesterday denounced a proposed luxury tax, county judges and commissioners of Oregon today endorsed a resolution favoring such a plan to raise money which would be applied to the counties for care of the needy and to cover the present payment of state old-age pensions. There have been reports in several quarters that a luxury tax will be proposed to the Oregon legislature when it meets next month. The 29th annual convention of the judges and commissioners also went on record opposing any diversion of the gasoline tax or of liquor control commission profits. The group approved a bill which would not employ for uncollected taxes. Relief administrative problems occupied much of the time of the delegates today. Judge David P. Graham of Malheur county suggested the administrative of all relief be placed within the jurisdiction of the county courts. Judge C. S. Claborn of Umatilla county countered with the statement that "it is government money that is being spent and the government doesn't want any elective officers spending federal funds." The master did not come to a vote. Opposition to the so-called "gin marriage law" and the statute providing that male applicants for marriage licenses must produce a medical certificate was voiced by the county clerks and recorders of Oregon, also in session here. DILLINGER ESCAPE ENGINEERED FOR \$11,000 IS CLAIM

CHICAGO, Ill., Dec. 19.—(AP) The Daily News said it had learned that John Dillinger bought his way out of the Crown Point, Ind., jail last March on a promise to pay \$11,000. Dillinger, it is said, kept his part of the bargain, but one of the middle men kept part of the money and those who aided him in the escape actually received only about half that amount. The News said that details of the Crown Point "wooden gun" episode and the Dillinger gang's escape from the Indiana state penitentiary were in the hands of Postal Inspectors J. R. McWhorter and Capt. J. McCarthy and Supervising Captain John Stege of the Chicago police. The information that Dillinger bought his way out of the Crown Point jail, the story related, came from Arthur O'Leary, former investi-

gator for Louis Piguet, Dillinger's lawyer, and under indictment with him on a charge of harboring Dillinger. The Daily News did not name the persons to whom the money was reported to have been paid, stating that as a matter of public policy it was not disclosing any information that might compromise the Dillinger accomplices. Indiana officials, the News said, were ready to return numerous indictments, some of which will include a few Indiana notables, covering the entire history of the Dillinger gang in that state. According to the story, Dillinger paid \$11,000 to a middle man, now a federal prisoner, and the middle man, being a little short of money himself, held out on his companions and eventually paid little more than half the amount promised.
