

### MEDICAL SCIENCE TOPIC OF SWEENEY AT LION LUNCHEON

Dr. Charles T. Sweeney was the speaker at the regular luncheon of the Lions club Wednesday, giving an instructive and interesting talk on the progress of medical science.

Dr. Sweeney cited many of the great strides in the medical profession, which he said has made more advancement in the past 50 years than in any previous 500-year period. He discussed the work of such doctors as Pasteur and Lister, telling of the work they did in the isolation of organisms, and in asepsis.

He said that the ravages of diphtheria 50 years ago frequently took every second child when epidemics broke out in thickly populated areas, but since the isolation of the germ and the discovery of an antitoxin, diphtheria epidemics may be prevented.

Referring to Dr. DeFoe, famous physician for the Dionne quintuplets, Dr. Sweeney said that if the typical country doctor had been a theorist, he probably would have been unsuccessful in caring for the Dionne babies. He said that the greatest medical discoveries have been made by country physicians.

The Lions discussed plans for the Christmas distribution of toys, which is to be done with the assistance of the volunteer firemen, and distribution of baskets of fruit for the blind, which George W. Newberry of the Medford Business college, chairman of the Lions' committee for the blind, is to be in charge.

Besides Dr. Sweeney, Tom Burke of Portland, Associated Oil Co., was a guest at the meeting.

The next meeting of the club will be held January 2, as Wednesday of next week comes on the day following Christmas.

### MAY SINK VESSEL PUTTING OUT FIRE

BOSTON, Dec. 21. (AP)—The mounting tons of water poured into the hold of the coastwise freighter Ontario as firemen fought to quench flames that raged uncontrolled, through the ship threatened today to send the steamer to the bottom of Boston harbor.

The Ontario returned to port here about 4 a. m., her hatches, ventilators and ports billowing smoke.

Fire broke out last night when she was two miles off Sandwich, near the Massachusetts bay entrance to the Cape Cod canal, southbound with a general cargo for Baltimore and Norfolk.

Her crew of 40 worked ceaselessly to hold the flames in check and fireboats and land engines added their efforts as tugs nosed her into her dock on Northern avenue here.

### PINE INDUSTRY SHOWS GAIN IN NEW BUSINESS

PORTLAND, Dec. 21. (AP)—New business amounting to \$8,389,000 feet, about 40 per cent above the three-year weekly average for December, was reported today by the Western Pine Association for the week ending December 15. The total was three per cent better than for the previous week.

Shipments totaled 37,370,000 feet and production was 19,832,000 feet. The same mills, for the corresponding week a year ago, showed orders of 29,231,000 feet, and production of 20,443,000 feet.

### CANADIAN WILD LIFE WORKING SOUTHWARD

A Canadian lynx weighing 50 pounds, the largest of its type ever seen here and the first lynx reported here in many seasons, was killed by a Deadwood hunter. Others reported seeing signs of a mountain lion, an animal that has not been seen in the Black Hills for years.

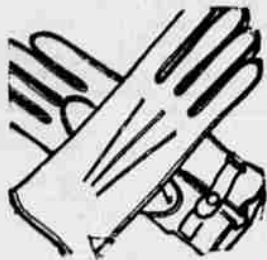
### 4000 Bootleggers Listed.

### TACOMA, Wash., Dec. 20.—(UP)—

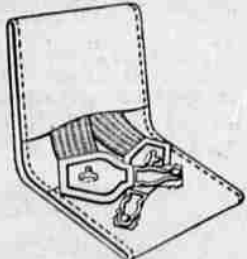
