GERMANY PLANS HUGE STADIUM FOR OLYMPIC GAMES

Stadium and Grounds Will Cost Over Four Million—Adolf Hitler Is Credited With Drafting Plans.

BERLIN (UP)—Tall cranes and dredges, a maze of iron girders, huge concrete slabs, and other building paraphernalia mark the vast area on the western outskirts here, where the Olympic stadium for the 1936 games is under construction.

According to the original plans the existing stadium was essentially to be maintained intact. The new plans now carried out leave of it nothing but the site. The old edifice has been torn down.

The new plans call not merely for the building of a stadium proper, in addition there are to be constructed an immense "festival meadow" with grandstands for the opening ceremony, an open-air amphitheater, a separate swimming stadium, a track for bicycle races, a huge tennis court, twelve fields for football and hockey, two ovals with cinder tracks and all other paraphernalia for training purposes, a special track for the equestrian tournament with grandstands and stables, and an additional swimming tank and a small lake to afford training accommodations for the aquatic teams, all rolled in one, and adorned with towers and turrets.

Only the edifices of the "sports forum," situated in one corner of the vast Olympic site, have been spared. The most modern, equipped halls of the forum are to be used for the Olympic fencing and other indoor events.

Better Roads
In addition to all of this construction of new roads to the stadium site will be built and existing ones will be repaired. Two railroad stations and one subway station adjoining the stadium area, too, will be reconstructed to handle the expected traffic.

Everything on the site is to be on a grand scale. The stadium proper will accommodate 100,000 spectators. The "festival meadow" is to afford room for 400,000 people on the field and in the grandstands. Over the principal grandstand around the meadow will loom the "Adolf Hitler tower."

The costs are estimated at approximately \$4,000,000. Part of this sum will be borne by the government, while part is furnished by the various sports associations which, for the purpose of collecting the necessary funds, are levying a special tax on every admission ticket for all athletic contests and tournaments.

FRANCE TO FOLLOW JAP DENUNCIATION OF NAVAL TREATY

Pacific was disclosed in Washington today as Emperor Hirohito in Tokyo signed documents necessary for abrogation of the Washington naval treaty.

Anthony J. Dimond, Alaskan delegate to congress, said he would press for establishment of an inland air base in Alaska and was confident of receiving strong support.

Japan probably will notify Washington officially of her abrogation decision tomorrow.

Newspapers in Tokyo charged the failure of tri-power conversations in London to achieve results was a result of American "obstinacy," and they lauded Britain's attitude.

American naval delegates in London said they were not surprised by this view, since they had placed the responsibility upon Japan because of her insistence upon tonnage equality.

ARIZONA READY TO BATTLE FOR WATER SHARING

Billion Dollar Prize at Stake in Irrigation War—Long An Issue in State's Political Circles.

PHOENIX, Ariz. (UP)—A bitter legislative battle over a billion dollar prize is foreseen for the twelfth state legislature as a result of the newest settlement plan for the prolonged Colorado river dispute.

With announcement from Washington by Secretary of the Interior Harold Ickes that construction of the Parker dam in Arizona will await a water and power settlement, politicians have prepared for the struggle that has disrupted Arizona politics for 15 years.

Man Abandon Claim
Whether the state will abandon claim to the right of appropriating 5,000,000 acre feet of water or more from the river in excess of the 2,800,000 acre feet proposed by Secretary Ickes under the Santa Fe compact and Boulder dam construction act, may be decided in the legislative meeting convening Jan. 14.

The issue involves abandonment, or adherence to the hope of irrigating upwards of 2,700,000 acres, proposed by the State River commission.

Claims of Opposition
Foes of the Interior Department-Arizona river contract claim that at least 5,000,000 acres is irrigable from a Glen Canyon-Verde diversion project, and that unused and unusable water in other states is more than 10,000,000 acre feet of Colorado waste water subject to appropriation under present laws.

Figuring also in the struggle will be the oft-repeated allegation of a plan of American capitalists to irrigate a fertile delta strip in Mexico below the international line. Arizona extremists who favor irrigation of the largest acreage and oppose any contract on water or power allege that limitations on use by various American states are designed to deliver the water unused to Mexico, where it may be diverted cheaply.

OREGON COUPLE HELD BY BERKELEY POLICE CONFESS ROBBERIES

BERKELEY, Cal., Dec. 21.—(AP)—

Two Oregon newsmen, the woman an expectant mother, were arrested here last night as a bandit team, after a chase along shopper-crowded sidewalks.

They told police they were Lawson Butler, 24, and Mrs. Butler, the former Iowa Ruth Ludington, 25, who added that she had been a school teacher at Creswell, Ore. They were married in January and had trapped

Dear Creswell since, they said. According to police, Butler "told al." Patrolman W. E. Schmidt saw him in the crowd and wanted to question him, but the couple scampered off.

When he caught up with them, Schmidt said, he found in the woman's purse the registration slip of an automobile reported stolen. Scarvy was the machine, which Butler assertedly admitted using.

Schmidt said he found in the car chains, wire, dynamite caps, fuses, a sawed-off shotgun, homemade tear gas bombs, ammunition, a sledge and mining drills. Butler admitted having robbed several chain stores and a drug store, explaining also the apparatus had been intended for a Berkeley theater safe-cracking, Schmidt reported.

LOS ANGELES RAIL TROUBLE SETTLED

LOS ANGELES, Dec. 21.—(AP)—

Settlement of the threatened strike of the Pacific Electric company trainmen was announced today by William E. Leiserson, national mediation board chairman.

Terms agreed to by company and union officials include pay increases of around five cents an hour and establishment of an eight hour day. The hourly wage increase was for interurban trainmen sleeping their hourly wage up from 55 1/2 cents to 60 cents January 1 and 63 cents July 1.

The threatened strike would have tied up service for 100,000 Los Angeles commuters and might have extended to a sympathetic walkout of western trainmen on three transcontinental railroads.

HEAVY RAINFALL BLOCKS HIGHWAY

PORTLAND, Ore., Dec. 21.—(AP)—

Sweeping rain storms that moved swiftly over northwestern Oregon and southwestern Washington yesterday and last night brought the first flood threat of the season and automobile associations of the two states warned motorists to inquire as to road conditions before undertaking long trips.

The Pacific highway was closed by water between Eugene and Junction City this morning but the highway department had provided a detour. The road also was blocked south of Eugene.

Storm warnings for small craft were ordered up at all Oregon and Washington coast stations at 8 a. m.
