

TEN NIGHTS' SHOW BOTH FINANCIAL AND FUN SUCCESS

Five hundred people turned back the calendar to the 90's Friday night at Oriental Gardens, and like a big, happy family seated around old-fashioned wooden tables and "whooping it up" just as did their parents and grandparents, saw the famous play, "Ten Nights in a Barroom" staged by a troupe of Ashland Legionsmen. In all its five ludicrous acts.

It was hard to tell whether the actors had the better time, prancing, scolding and joking their way about the stage, or the audience, who joined in the singing and fun-making between mouthfuls of refreshments served by a group of vocalizing waiters and members of the Legion Auxiliary.

The play was pronounced even better than when it was first given by the Ashland post in the Little city last Thanksgiving, and lived up to expectations for "the older" town-folkery. General Chairman Morris Leonard, Lee Garlock, chairman of the sales committee, and Commander Earl Foy announced that the presentation was a great financial success, and were delighted with the large crowd.

Nearly fifteen per cent of the women present dressed in 1890 costumes, which were very pretty with their ruffles, bustles and lace, while a large number of men went with the actors themselves in old-fashioned make-up. Many of the men in the audience had mustaches to go with their top hats and swallow tail coats.

On the stage of the improvised old time "oper" house, the Ashland actors went through the immortal classic of the kerfuffle circuits with gusto, and in the auditor portions proved themselves deep-dyed tragedians. The play opened outside the "Sickle and Sheaf," and through manipulation of stage property not unlike that which gave prop-boys gray hair in the old days, the scenes switched back and forth between the inside and outside of the "Sickle and Sheaf," while the characters carried out the deepest pathos and most brutal villainism to the last act.

Mercurial Hope, who took the part of Simon Black, the villain, made the most of his part in the play, and gained the boss of the audience in almost as great numbers as his predecessors of the stage. Through the self-control the audience maintained, the group of players returned to Ashland without serious marks from peanut shells or heavier missiles, and were lauded after the play for their creditable performance.

The part of the Deacon was admirably played by Blug McCarthy; Swibel, who almost "downfell," was enacted by Archie McDuff, and Meditabile, a sweet maid in her teens, was characterized by the most delicate bluish by Lacie Tiah. The drunkard was played by Billy Smythe, who in one of his delirious tremors cruelly struck his little daughter, played by Alice Jeters, with a beer bottle. Maud Love had the part of the drunkard's wife, and did her "darndest" to keep him on the straight and narrow path. The sport who went to jail for his misdoings was played by Horace Hemingway, the son-of-a-bartender was enacted by Eben Ezer, and the cast was completed by Perry Weeks as the young blade of the village.

Besides the fat-dancers, old-fashioned crooners, the man on the flying trapeze, and other diversified entertainers between the acts, several musical numbers were presented by a group of Medford singers, and Sebastian Apollo offered a piano rendition.

Morris Leonard stated that he greatly appreciates the work of the committee in making the play the success that it was, extending thanks to all especially to Col. Holmes, assistant chairman, Fred Scheffel, house committee chairman; Lee Garlock, chairman of the ticket sales committee, and Henry Pace, chairman of the concession committee.

Commander Foy extended his appreciation to Morris Leonard and his staff of workers, to Horace Bromley, Herb Grey and E. C. Ferguson of the publicity committee, and especially to the troupe of players from the Ashland Legion post.

COLBY FREED BY SPEEDY VERDICT
