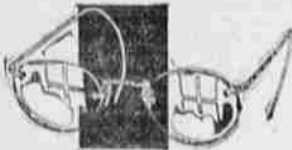
The Misses Suzette Bennett, Margaret Boyle and Gertrude Boyle, arrived Friday night from Oregon State college.
