REIMER'S WAR ON BLIGHT TOLD IN MAGAZINE STORY

Research Work Carried On at Talent Experiment Station for 23 Years—World Is Searched for Resistant

For 23 years Professor F. C. Reimer of the southern Oregon branch experiment station near Talent, the heart of the most important pear-producing district of the state, has been carrying on research work with pears, which has resulted in the certainty that the day has come when pear-blight may plant pear trees in regions most stricken with fire-blight without fear that they will lose either the roots or the trunk stock to that disease.

This result from Reimer's exhaustive research work, and the further probable result that besides the roots and trunks being immune to fire-blight, the day is not far off when the bearing portion of the trees will also be immunized, is outlined in an article appearing in the January issue of the Country Gentleman. The article, a complete story of how Reimer tirelessly worked with seedling trees year after year to build up their blight-resistant characteristics, was written by John C. Burtnor of the agricultural department at Oregon State college.

Develops New Varieties. Mr. Burtnor describes how Reimer literally explored the world in search of species of pears aside from the common Pyrus communitis variety which would be free from blight and suitable for root and trunk stock in his experiments. The professor was most successful in finding usable blight-resistant seedlings or named varieties among the common stock, and is now in the midst, Mr. Burtnor states, of research work directed toward developing new commercial or home varieties of pears free of blight and suitable in fruiting and growing habits.

Reimer made two Asiatic explorations, resulting in the collection of many species of the genus Pyrus, which, although many of them bear fruit resembling more the green hawthorn "apple" than the pear, were tested out for root stock. These varieties, which are doing fairly well in root stock in one small orchard 14 years old, according to the article, carried over a plan of inoculation of seedling trees of blight-resistant French pear stocks. Out of a total of 7,004 seedlings when he began the inoculation with blight-bacteria culture, there were only seven seedlings left at the end of the five-year period, which, when tested, were found to be fully resistant to blight and possessed of vigorous growing habits.

Stunning Discoveries. The results of the last five years of continued experimentation were described as "far beyond Reimer's fondest hopes," for they proved that these seven seedlings transmit their blight-resistant characteristics to their offspring. "The difference in vigor between these selected hybrids and the common commercial run of French seedlings is positively startling," the article declared.

The writer continued to state that steps are now being taken to obtain public-service patent on the first blight-resistant variety named. He said that the seven seedling parents, so that the stock may be released to growers and nurserymen.

Reimer discovered some years ago, while visiting in the middle west, one seedling tree which had resisted the onslaught of disease in a district where blight conditions were considered so bad as to preclude all pear growing. Reimer secured some scion wood from this tree, which had been named Farmingdale, and propagated it at the southern Oregon branch station. Then Reimer made a cross between Farmingdale and another blight-resistant variety named Old Hedges, which had resisted the onslaught of disease in a district where blight conditions were considered so bad
