



### OREGON CAGEMEN DEFEAT COUGARS 32-27, IN RALLY

EUGENE, Jan. 5.—(AP)—The University of Oregon basketball team, which warmed up in the first half and plays basketball in the second, overcame a 16 to 8 lead held by Washington state here at halftime tonight to lock the Cougars in a thrill-filled conference game, 32 to 27.

The Webfoots won Friday night, 35 to 28.

Although the entire Oregon team began clicking in the second half tonight it was the combination of "Second-half Sam" Liebowitz and lanky Bill Harcombe, rookie center, that gave the Webfooters a victory.

Liebowitz sank several mid-floor howitzer shots near the end of the game, coupled with two bucket shots by Harcombe to pull the game out of the fire.

Liebowitz and Willie Jones tied for high point honors, with 10 markers each, while Harcombe trailed close behind with 9.

Budd Jones, who played a fine floor game for Oregon, had four assist passes leading to scores and Liebowitz had three. Last night Liebowitz had seven.

Bill Reinhardt, Webfoot coach, is just baseball player enough to play a bunch. Last night at the half he shifted his regular center, Willie Jones, to forward and placed the inexperienced Harcombe into the pivot position. It worked and Reinhardt started the same combination to-night.

### ALABAMA GET NOISY WELCOME

TUSCALOOSA, Ala., Jan. 5.—(AP)—Whistles shrieked, a band blared the battle hymn and 5,000 adoring citizens and students today joined in a royal welcome to Alabama's crimson tide fresh from new triumphs in Pasadena's Rose Bowl.

And the crimson tide responded with boyish grins and waves as they piled off their train tonight to mount a platform as guests of honor to hear themselves praised by University officials and leading citizens.

Dr. George Denny, president of the University of Alabama, greeted the returning heroes, and expressed his appreciation for their victory and sportsmanship.

The blast of the whistle of the locomotive of the Crimson Tide special was the signal for their fire alarm and factory whistles to screech their welcome, and a tremendous shout went up from the crowd.

'LEAD BELLY,' NEGRO KING OF GUITAR, HAS FUTURE ON BROADWAY

NEW YORK, Jan. 5.—(AP)—Broadway impresarios were angling tonight for the services of a Louisiana swamp negro called "Lead Belly" who twice has sung and played his way out of prison.

Brought to New York by John A. Lomax, Austin, Texas, collector of folk songs, "Lead Belly" "wowed" an audience at his first performance that he brought booking agents on the run.

Lomax, who has been touring the south under a grant from the Carnegie corporation, making phonograph records of negro folk songs for the Library of Congress, said he found "Lead Belly" serving a sentence for assault in the Louisiana state prison.

"Lead Belly" who was born Huddie Ledbetter and is the self-acknowledged "king of the twelve-string guitar," sang an appeal for freedom and Lomax presented a record of his plea to the governor. A month later he was free.

Willis Smith, midget halfback from University of Idaho, and Bill Morgan of Medford, former Oregon tackle, are prominent members of the Giant band.

### U. S. G. A. IN DIRE NEED OF MEMBERS

NEW YORK, Jan. 5.—(AP)—While the United States Golf association closed the year 1934 with a balance of \$4,649, Herbert Jaques, of Boston, the retiring president today warned the annual meeting that unless the association's club membership roster is increased during the current year continued curtailment of activities will be necessary.

Jaques closed out ten years with the association, the last two as its chief executive, turning the gavel over to Prescott S. Bush, of Greenwich, Conn. Bush along with other officers and members of the executive and nominating committees were unanimously elected on one ballot, cast by the secretary.

Harkening back to the days of 1929 when the U. S. G. A. had 1,129 clubs on its roster, Jaques disclosed that the present membership is only 839 and said 65 clubs resigned last year.

"The visit of our American League All-Stars and particularly of Babe Ruth to Japan was one of the greatest peace measures in the history of nations," he said.
