## UNORTHODOX AGES MATCHED IN MAIN EVENT AT ARMORY

### Fiery Belcastro Promises to Show Countrymen Some New Tricks in Punishment—Hubka, High in Opener

If the wrestling match last week between Pete Belcastro, belligerent Italian, and Red Devi seemed rough, then the one tonight between Belcastro and Tony Catalano, another holy terror when it comes to unorthodox grapplers, should prove as entertaining, speaking in terms of excitement, as an eruption of Mount Vesuvius.

Both Catalano and Belcastro, who represent the northern and southern sections of Italy respectively, don't know the meaning of the word "fair," or, if they do, they seldom apply it in the ring.

Although a tooth was broken and his neck badly twisted in the colorful bout last week he won from the mysterious means of a foul, Belcastro is ready to "take" Catalano in short order. He intends to use everything he knows in the line of dirt, which will probably be no less than what Catalano has up his sleeve.

Arriving a few days early "to get used to the cold weather up here," Pete said last night that he intends to tear Catalano apart, and that he will then wrap up his fellow countryman and send him back to the old country, as "One wild Italian is enough over here."

It is expected that when these two choke and chuckle artists clash, it will take even a faster camera than Verne Shangle intends to use to catch them in one place long enough for a picture. There will be no long, drawn out grunts and groans in this battle. It will be one glorified series of haymakers, kicks (both the plain and fancy drop-kick varieties) and occasional healthy "chaws" with the teeth. The odds stand about even, but it is believed that Belcastro may never before tussled a man as unorthodox as his rival countryman.

Promoter Mack Lillard has planned to meet the taste of every fan, however, by assuring one bout of absolutely straight bona bending. Joe Hubka, former football player from the University of Nebraska, will be the party of the first part, and Jimmy Hym of Chicago, a newcomer to the Pacific coast, and a highly-touted one will be the party of the second part.

Fans have anticipated this third appearance here of Hubka, who knows his hammerlocks, and is one of the fastest heavyweighters ever to visit Medford. This boy likes to wrestle with his feet, and plans to do plenty in the way of Indian deathlocks and scissor holds against the Windy City man.

High is also considered a thoroughly clean and scientific wrestler, coming to Medford and the west coast with a record of few defeats. It is very seldom that two such top-notch scientific grapplers are sized against each other, but when they are the result inevitably is a match that fans go home talking about.

## LOTT, STOEFFEN SHORN OF LAURELS IN DEBUT AS TENNIS WORKMEN

NEW YORK, Jan. 10.—(AP)—Pugnosed George Lott and Lester "Little Rollo" Stoeffen, a couple of weary young athletes, were nearly started on the way to their first million today, but for them both the start of this professional tennis road was paved with nothing but dollars and disillusionment.

They came into Madison Square Garden before 14,816 people last night—a crowd that for ermine, starched shirts and tall hats rivaled a metropolitan opera opening—and they lost all but honor and the 12½ per cent of the \$20,000 net gate receipts. Promoter Bill O'Brien paid them for their professional debut.

First, But Tilden, despite his 42 years, knocked Lott off in straight sets of a single match, 6-4, 7-5, and then Tilden and long Ellsworth Vines stripped them of their right to the title of the world's greatest doubles team, amateur or professional, by winning one of the most sensational matches ever played, 3-6, 14-16, 11-13, 8-6, 6-4.

So long did the doubles match rage, 2 hours and 51 minutes, that it was too late when it ended to stage the final scheduled contest, a singles combat between Vines and Stoeffen.

Vines was a magnificent improvement on the youngster who only a year ago made his professional debut.

## 'FUMBLER' DROP KICK WINS GRAPPLING BOUT FOR VETERAN SAVOLDI

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 10.—(AP)—What practically amounted to a fumble decided a spectacular drop kick, flying tackle wrestling match in favor of Joe Savoldi when he met Paul Boesch here last night.

Each scored a fall—or shoulder touch-down—as their punishing "punting" duel waxed warm.

Then in the final session Boesch's drop kicks had Savoldi on the run toward coffin corner—almost toward the coffin itself, it seemed. But Boesch, bracing for a finishing crossing lunge, stepped on Referee Verne Harrington's size 10 foot and "fumbled" away his balance.

Savoldi, of Three Oaks, Mich., weighed 260. Jack Washburn, 240, Boston, threw Tony Catalano, 215, Chicago, in the second round. Plying tactics brought Joe Hubka, 205, Nebraska, a first-round fall over Wildcat Johnson, 195, Los Angeles.

## BURGHER'S QUINT PLAYS ST. MARYS STARS ON FRIDAY

By Dick Applegate. Medford basketball fans have asked for it, and they're going to get it—an exhibition game between the untried but hard fighting local high school, and the fast breaking and clever St. Mary's all-star five.

"Burg" Burgher (the high school coach revealed this morning that is what he was called by his classmates in college) has signed the independent team for the feature game of a regular contest to be played at the high school gym Friday night. The next night Burg's team will meet the Roseburg bunch here.

The high school quint worked out last night using a new scoring combination with Ray Lewis in the line-up. The five, comprised of Ettinger, Smith, Sears, Kunzman and Lewis ran up 26 points to the second string's 2. In a few minutes, something that they have not been able to do regularly.

Ray Ettinger, at center, is improving rapidly, especially in following shots in to take them off the back board for tripples.

Smith, the southpaw guard, has been practicing diligently on his passing, and cut-back floor work, as has been Kunzman, who is developing a dead-eye for long ones which tick the net regularly. Smith's forte is his turning leap shot, which accounted for several points last night.

Lewis, in tomorrow's encounter will have his hands full in trying to get by his brothers Bob and Dick. St. Mary's flashes. A family encounter which should add considerably to an already interesting situation.

The Saint team has run up an impressive record this year, losing only two out of ten games played. One of the two was the exciting game lost to the SONS frosh in Ashland Saturday night, 35-33. They met and defeated the powerful Crescent City all-stars in that city two weeks ago. The ocean city team is the same one that last year handed a stinging defeat to the highly rated House of David barnstormers.

With Bud Lindley at center, Harris and Bob Lewis at guards, and Dick Lewis and Hoke Curtiss at forwards, the Gaels present a swift breaking offense and stone wall defense that may hand the Burgher-masters a beating, according to Burgher himself, who optimistically presented the thought that if his team goes down to defeat before the independent flashes, at least the game will be close and hard-fought.

The preliminary will start at 7:30, with the participants not yet announced. Coach Kirtley of the Tiger Cubs is on crutches with a sprained ankle received in practice, but may send his players against an opponent in the curtain raiser. Burgher has been coaching the Cubs during Kirtley's absence.

## SPORT SLANTS

There's a lot more to this game of table tennis than meets the eye. And especially when you're watching world's champion table tennis team in action. Then it's almost too fast to follow.

The visiting team of Hungarian table tennis stars, Viktor Barna, world's champion for the past four years, and Sander Glancz, former English and Hungarian champion, made an auspicious debut in Philadelphia when they trounced the United States' team without the loss of a single game.

In their amazing bow they defeated Coleman Clark, of Chicago, a former national title holder, and Edward Silverglad, of Trenton, N. J. Perry Once Ruled Nooit Barna, a Hungarian living in Paris has been the outstanding star of the game, since Fred Perry, of England, the present ranking amateur lawn tennis player of the world, last won the world's table tennis crown in 1929.

Glancz, the only player who has beaten Barna in the past two years, was world's top ranking table tennis player in 1927.

This famous international pair has been instrumental in winning the Swaythling cup, emblematic of the world's table tennis team supremacy, seven out of eight times since Lady Swaythling donated the trophy in 1928.

There must be something to this game of table tennis—call it ping-pong if you prefer, if there are ten million players in America, as it is claimed.

The ball travels such a short distance and so fast that it comes bouncing back to you. No time to get ready for a shot when you're playing this brand of tennis.

The Old Fundamentals And yet it takes timing and delicate touch, lots of both. Short, darting strokes, made so by the necessity of returning the ball in a split second. You don't have much trouble working up a sweat, either.

While it looks much like its big brother, lawn tennis, few lawn tennis stars have been particularly adept at the table game. Fred Perry is the one exception. Still Perry is the world's table tennis title in 1929 before he took up lawn tennis seriously.

Most of the present day lawn tennis stars enjoy a match of the table variety and many play a fair game but it is very doubtful if one of them could extend any of the 30 top ranking table tennis stars in the country.
