### St. Mary's Boasts Many Former Brilliant Performers of High School—Roseburg Has New System

For their second game of this season, the red and black Tigers from Medford high school will trade hoop ringers with the strong and highly polished St. Mary's All-Stars tonight at 8 o'clock at the Medford high school gym. On Saturday night the Tigers will face their first real conference test of the season against the strong Roseburg Indians, starting at 9 o'clock at the Medford high school gym. Preliminaries will be played both nights, Friday night starting at 7 o'clock and Saturday night at 8 o'clock.

The game Saturday night is being held at 9 o'clock for the purpose of giving business men and shoppers a chance to attend without having to sidestep any already scheduled business.

When returning to the All-Stars as such, one can truly state them as Medford All-Stars, for the squad includes Bud Lindley and Odd Hughes members of the Medford high team which were state touring champions in Salem three years ago and nearly copied the state pennant. Lloyd Hammock, a member of the squad that went to the tournament in 1933; Wayne Harris, also a member of the squad that went to the tournament in 1933; Dick Lewis, one of the line of Lewis, who for so long dominated the sports world at St. Mary's academy; Bob Lewis, brother of Dick, and also a member of the wonder teams at St. Mary's, who with George Smith and Dick Sakraida kept the ball rolling on the courts of the academy.

There remains two members who didn't break into the limelight as often as did the above named, but were indirectly responsible for the success of the already named stars. Jerry Trill and Hoke Curtis, who were members of the shock troops that every night during their high school days stayed out and absorbed basketball knowledge and served as opponents in the daily scrimmages that are so vital to any successful basketball team. Lindley served as center on the Tiger lineup while in school, Hughes as forward, Hammock as center and guard, Harris as center and forward, Curtis as forward and Trill as guard. Dick Lewis, Bob Lewis as forwards and guards, Smith as guard and Sakraida as guard.

Coach Burger stated that his boys were in the best shape possible for the game.

According to reports from the city of Roseburg the Indians will invade the hill of the Medford Tigers with a new system designed by their new coach, Bill Warren. The Indians have practically the same lineup they had last year when they played the Tigers. Thus far the Indians have won two and lost two. The two wins, however, were over the strong University High of Eugene, and the two losses were sustained in games played with secondary teams in which the Roseburg coach stated he was merely speculating for rough spots and new material.

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PETE DROPKICKS ROUGHHOUSE FOE FOR ODD TUMBLE

Five minutes, jammed full of rabbit punches and well-directed dropkicks, was too much for Tony Catalano, rough-house Italian grappler, and very nearly spelled ruin as well for Referee Ray Frisbie, when Pete Belcastro, the original wild Italian, got off some of the best fancy kicking of his career to win the third and deciding fall of the main event match last night at the armory.

After connecting with Catalano's midriff with no less than four of his double-leg punches, Pete miscalculated one and knocked the wind from Frisbie, but held his opponent to the mat with a press until the referee was finally able to award him the fall.

Belcastro, displaying more orthodox wrestling than he has used in any one bout for some time, had things well in hand during most of the contest, but was given some rough treatment that very nearly cost him the tussle. He won the first fall in two minutes, when the referee refused to let Catalano get away with any more of the choke holds he insisted on applying.

Tony, weighing 215 against Pete's 191½, took the second tumble with an airplane spin in 15 minutes. It was one of the very few times that Catalano resorted to genuine wrestling tactics, using fists and teeth throughout most of the fray.

The middle fall saw Belcastro open hostilities by tweaking the paunchy Catalano's mustache. Then Belcastro cleverly applied a leg split, reached under Catalano's belt, pro-

cured some of the mysterious "pepper" with which Tony is wont to blind some of his opponents, and treated the big choke and chuckle artist to some of his own medicine.

Catalano was kept scampering out of the ring by Pete's sudden attacks of Sonnenbergs. Whenever Belcastro hit the ropes, out went Catalano, very nearly coming to grief once when three or four of the spectators threatened to "crown" him with their chairs.

Joe Hubka, popular ex-athlete from University of Nebraska, took two straight falls in the semi-final from Jimmy High of Chicago, chunky newcomer to the Pacific coast.

The cornhusker used a giant swing and a body press to end the second fall in two minutes, after the two had used several flying mares that shook the platform.

A series of Sonnenbergs and a press was good for the first fall, after 19½ minutes of hard and fairly clean grappling. High, however, displayed a desire for choking and biting that gave Hubka some trouble.

But the 204-pound Nebraska lad's
