## HERMIT ARRAIGNED PLEADS INNOCENT

GRANTS PASS, Jan. 14.—(AP)—Hugo Mayer, "Hermit of the Crags," pleaded not guilty to the murder of Robert Fantz, lower Illinois river valley rancher, on arraignment in circuit court here this morning. He is indicted by the county grand jury Saturday.

When asked for his plea, Mayer said: "I killed him, all right."

"Do you then plead guilty?" Judge Norton asked.

Mayer started to reply but his attorney, W. T. Miller, stepped forward and said the plea would be not guilty.

Fantz was shot November 9 in the wilderness district on the Curry-Josephine county line.

If Mayer continues to admit the shooting, it is expected several courses are open to his attorney: To plead justifiable homicide, insanity, or that the shooting occurred in Curry county. The later claim, if upheld, would bring a change of venue and delay the trial.

**BYRD SLED PARTY GOES NEAR POLE**

LITTLE AMERICA, Antarctica, Jan. 13.—(Delayed)—(AP)—Three members of the Byrd expedition have returned from a 1410-mile sledging trip which carried them within 180 miles of the South Pole.

Within 200 miles of the pole they found coal deposits and fossil remains 12 to 16 inches in diameter, ages-old evidence of an epoch when the Antarctic had a mild climate.

## CORBETT, COOTER TO HEAD HOUSES NEW LEGISLATURE

Cooter of Lincoln county unanimously elected speaker, effected according to schedule. Both Corbett and Cooter were sworn into office by Chief Justice J. U. Campbell, who likewise swore in members of the two houses.

During the morning ceremonies, both houses were crowded to capacity. Adjournment was taken until 2 o'clock, at which time the joint session will be called for the inauguration program. During the organization of the senate, W. H. Strayer, veteran Democratic senator from Baker county, presided. In the house Howard Latourrette of Multnomah county presided.

Senate clerks and officials in addition to Hunt included Elizabeth Clait, assistant chief clerk; Zylphia Burns Calendar, clerk; Mark Woodruff, reading clerk; Allen Wheeler, sergeant-at-arms; James Kyle, doorkeeper, and W. F. King, malling clerk.

Representative Cooter was nominated by Earl Hill of Lane county, who was slated for speaker until after the November election which brought a Democratic organization. The nomination was seconded by William L. Dickson of Multnomah county. Cooter received 59 of the 60 votes, not choosing to cast a vote for himself.

Other house officials, all of whom were unanimously elected, were Fred Drager of Salem, chief clerk since 1909; Edward Duffy, Multnomah county, assistant chief clerk; James Kenner, Clatskanie, reading clerk; Kenneth S. Perry, Klamath Falls, calendar clerk; Capt. Melvin C. Lane, Portland, sergeant-at-arms; P. J. Simmons, Oswego, doorkeeper, and H. D. Nolan, Washington county, mailing clerk.
