



GHEZZI WINS DUEL WITH REVOLTA FOR TOP TOURNEY COIN

LOS ANGELES, Jan. 16.—(AP)—Youth was in the vanguard today, pockets bulging with most of the prize money as the golfing army moved toward northern California for the Sacramento and San Francisco stopovers on the winter tournament trail.

Victor Ghezzi of Deal, N. J., and John Revolta, Milwaukee, formed the advance guard, with Harold McSpaden, Kansas City, Mo., not far behind. Ghezzi won the Los Angeles open title yesterday in an 18-hole playoff with Revolta after they had tied after the regulation 72 holes of play with 285, but their earnings were the same, since they split first and second place and \$200 more picked up from the gallery at the playoff for \$1175 apiece.

McSpaden, Pasadena open champion, earned \$1000 for winning the first test of the winter schedule in the California.

The first stop will be at Sacramento, Friday, where the golf granddaddy open a three-day stand for \$2,500 to be obtained after 72 holes of medal play. From there they go on to San Francisco to participate in the annual \$4000 match play "tournament" starting January 24.

Ghezzi, professional of the Deal Golf club, shot a 73 over the stubborn, rain-soaked, wind-swept Los Angeles Country club yesterday in winning the tenth annual open title from Revolta by two strokes.

ASHLAND TO FACE CAVEMEN FRIDAY

ASHLAND, Jan. 16.—(Sp.)—Coach Don Faber's Ashland high school Grizzlies will open their 1935 southern Oregon conference basketball season next Friday night at Ashland when they tangle with Grants Pass high, the dark horse of the league.

With the exception of Billy Hoxie, the dead eye forward who has a touch of flu, Ashland will present the identical lineup that reached the semi-finals in the state tournament last year. Bob Hardy, who has scored 151 points in 13 games so far, will be in the tipoff position. Parker Hess and Bill Jungert, forwards, and Helmer Kannasto and Ken Schillings, guards.

In 14 games played to date, the high-powered Grizzlies have emerged on the long end of the score 11 times, the lone defeat being at the hands of the state champion Astoria Fishermen. Ashland is odds on favorite to successfully defend their southern Oregon title, won last year.

Saturday night of this week, Ashland plays host to Mt. Shasta high, one of the strongest teams in northern California.
