

MINES OF OREGON INCREASE OUTPUT BUREAU REPORTS

Total Value \$1,172,000 in 1934 As Compared With \$526,188 During 1933, Summary Discloses.

The total value of the output of gold, silver, copper, lead, and zinc from mines in Oregon increased from \$526,188 in 1933 to about \$1,172,000 in 1934, a gain of 123 per cent, according to the U. S. Bureau of mines, Department of the Interior. The 1934 total value was the highest since 1920 and reflected the increased price of gold and silver as well as the improved conditions in the industry that encouraged larger production throughout the state. Gold supplied approximately 97 per cent of the total value and silver almost the entire balance. Copper, lead, and zinc production was small and the aggregate value of these metals was less than \$8,500.

The gold output in Oregon in 1934 was about 32,200 fine ounces, valued at \$1,125,390 (\$34.95 a fine ounce), compared with 20,240 ounces, valued at \$517,326 (\$25.56 a fine ounce), in 1933. Placer mining, although hampered by water shortages, contributed the larger part of the output. The Rogue River Gold company, which operated a gold dredge on Poote Creek in this county, was one of the outstanding producers of placer gold in the state last year, although shut down for 7 months out of the year due to lack of water.

In Western Oregon the production of placer gold came largely from Jackson and Josephine counties and, with the exception of the Rogue River Gold Co., was derived largely from small operations and sold to local banks and bullion buyers.

Principal producers of lode gold in this section of the state were the Chieftan and Huckleberry mines in Douglas county, the Ashland mine in Jackson county, and the Rainbow mine in Josephine county. In the Ashland mine additional equipment was installed and a cyanide plant was under construction, while in the Jacksonville district there was activity in both quartz and placer mining.

CULINARY CRAFT....

Winter Vegetable Dishes.
At this time of the year we become interested in changing the appearance of the foods we have been serving, so as to appeal to the appetite and sort of coax us to consume the right foods for our needs in winter-time. Like the new dresses we put up to brighten up our spirits during these dull colored days, we dress up our good friends, the foods of every day.

Green Beans with Tomato Sauce.
1 qt. canned green beans
1/2 c (1 small can) tomato sauce
Ham or bacon "drippings"
Drain the beans and add tomato sauce. Pour into pan which contains a little heated ham or bacon fat, and cook about 20 minutes.

Carrot and Apple Casserole.
2 c cooked and sliced carrots
2 c sliced raw apples
2 T brown sugar
4 T butter
1 t grated lemon rind.
Butter casserole and place in it alternate layers of carrots and apples. Sprinkle each layer with combined sugar, butter and lemon rind. Bake at 350 degrees (or with oven dinner) for one hour. Use covered casserole.

Corn Oyster.
1 No. 2 can of sweet corn
3 T flour
1 t baking powder
1/4 t salt
3 eggs, beaten separately.
Combine all ingredients, folding in beaten whites last, and drop into hot fat to cook until nicely browned. Serve with syrup or marmalade.

Paransips au Gratin.
2 c diced cooked paransips
4 T butter
4 T flour
1/2 t salt
2 c milk
2-3 c bread crumbs
1/2 c grated cheese.

Make white sauce of the butter, flour, salt and milk. Arrange the paransips in a buttered casserole, pour the sauce over them. Sprinkle the crumbs over this and the cheese over all. Bake at 350 degrees for 30 minutes.

Glazed Onions.
1 lb. small white onions
4 T butter
3 T brown sugar
Cook onions in boiling water until just tender, then drain and dry. Melt butter in saucepan and add sugar, then pour in the onions and cook over low heat, shaking often, until onions are glazed.

Spiced Carrots.
8 c diced cooked carrots
2 T vinegar
2 T sugar
4 T melted butter
1/2 t ground cloves
Melt butter and add sugar, vinegar and cloves. Pour over the hot carrots.
