

### MARTIN'S PROGRAM FACES OPPOSITION IN LOWER BRANCH

#### Bill Referred to Sub-Committee After Attacks on Virtually Every Section — May Redraft Measure

SALLEM, Jan. 18.—(AP)—Expectations that Governor Martin's state planning commission measure would soon be brought to a vote in the house were dashed when the measure came before the critical eye of the joint ways and means committee last night.

After virtually every section of the bill had been attacked it was finally referred to a subcommittee of three members, who were scheduled to meet with Estes Snedecor, acting in advisory capacity to the governor, and report to the next meeting of the joint group.

Henry Semon, as chairman of the house ways and means committee acting as chairman of the combined group last night, appointed Representative Warner B. Snider, Senator Henry L. Hess and Senator W. H. Strayer as the committee to meet with Snedecor for possible redrafting of the measure.

#### Snider Opens Attack

Snider opened the attack on section five of the bill holding that it gave the planning board too much power in its relations with institutional heads, commissions and various departments, and that it would be within the power of the proposed nine-member board to change functions of departments and make political changes without reference to the legislature and limited only by definite grants of power in the constitution to existing departments.

Senator Strayer, waiting as usual until discussion had gone the rounds, called attention to a provision of section one in which it was stated that "by a vote of seven members the board may request and enforce the resignation of a member." Upon Strayer's question as to whether that section might not be removed without objection Snedecor replied that "I believe the governor would not object to its removal."

#### Cooperation Expected

When Strayer questioned whether the planning board might come in conflict with the highway commission or other departments in the exercise of their implied powers, Snedecor replied in the affirmative but stated that in such cases the planning board could be expected to cooperate with the commission or department as the case might be.

Snedecor submitted an amended paragraph for the disputed section five of the act, but it was referred to the sub-committee along with the rest of the proposal.

A move early in the discussion to consider only section 10 of the measure calling for the appropriation of \$40,000 to defray expenses of the proposed planning board and to pay salaries, wages and other expenses of its employees, ended when several members maintained that the measure would have to be considered as a whole and not in part.

#### Full Investigation Wanted

Senator Hess flatly declared he would not "pass on the measure one way or another until it has been fully explained and investigated."

The meeting adjourned after an hour's debate to meet again probably next Tuesday.

At the opening of the discussion the joint chairman, Semon, and Senator Dean Walker, announced the personnel of the standing sub-committees who were named to study the 1935 budget and report their findings to the main group.

Several items of policy mentioned at the initial meeting Thursday including possible salary adjustments, higher education liability diversion, building program and consideration of commodity price changes were again left for discussion at a future meeting.

children and to improve public health was too sweeping. Representative Eaton (R., N. J.) called it "too big a dose to take at one swallow" and raised the question whether it wouldn't "dry up the fountain of personal and private charity."

Workers Should Contribute  
Senator Van Nuys (D., Ind.) took issue with the proposal to finance unemployment insurance by a payroll tax paid solely by employers and reaching 3 per cent on January 1, 1938. He said workers should be required to contribute something because otherwise "the benefits are really a dole which all self-respecting labor abhors."

Though the administration plan calls for federal expenditures of more than \$98,000,000 the first year and \$217,000,000 annually for several years after that, there were indications that when the legislation introduced by Senator Wagner (D., N. Y.) and Representative Lewis (D., Mo.) is rounded into final shape, these figures may be altered.

But bearing in mind the president's warning that efforts for economic security must not be "jeopardized now by extravagant action," the Democratic leaders were sweeping the boards for action. Chairman Pat Harrison of the senate finance committee scheduled hearings for next Tuesday.

### FORMER KERBY WOMAN KILLED IN SMASHUP

GRANT'S PASS, Jan. 18.—(Sp.)—Word has been received here of the death of Mrs. Albert Hieston (Agnes Sherier), daughter of Mr. and Mrs. L. C. Sherier of Kerby, at Merced, Calif., last Friday. Death resulted from a fractured skull Mrs. Hieston received in an auto accident there December 27.

Mr. Hieston is also in a critical condition, having received two broken legs, a broken hip, and other injuries in the same accident, and the body of Mrs. Hieston is being held there for a time to determine whether her husband will recover.

### TWENTY CHILDREN NOW ENROLLED IN NURSERY SCHOOL

The Medford nursery school has enrolled 20 children between the ages of two and five years, during the first three weeks. These children come from families registered for relief work and are designated by the case workers of the county relief office. Under the emergency educational relief program, similar schools have been established in St. Helens, Oregon City, Salem, Albany, Corvallis, Eugene, Toledo, Marshfield, Klamath Falls, Pendleton, and three in Portland.

C. O. Smith, city school superintendent, supervises the school locally, under the direction and with the assistance of Mrs. Sarah V. Case, state supervisor of nursery schools and parent education. Miss Lucile Skaffe of Silverton, a home economics graduate of Oregon State college, is head teacher. Miss May Bonham of Phoenix is her assistant. Both teachers have taken a month's intensive training in nursery school work, which is required by federal regulations before one may teach in a nursery school unit.

Health of the enrolled children is safeguarded by a physical examination, weekly visits of the school nurse, and daily inspection by the teachers. The nutritious noon meals include a protein—egg, fish, cheese, or meat; a vegetable rich in minerals and vitamins; a raw vegetable, a starchy food—cereal, bread or potatoes, dessert, milk and butter. A mid-morning lunch of cod-liver oil and tomato juice is served. Milk and Graham crackers are served when the children get up from their naps.
