MID-YEAR SEMESTER IN MEDFORD SCHOOLS OPENS THIS MORNING

This morning found students of all ages sending their way back to the Medford public schools for another semester of study, athletics and various activities. Little change in enrollment is noticed at mid-year, but many children transfer from the four grade schools to Junior high and from Junior high to the Senior high school. Comparatively few are graduating from the Senior high at mid-term.

The term just opening will run until late in May, when school is closed for the summer vacation months. Few realize the large number of courses offered by the city school system. The Medford Senior high school has courses ranging from chemistry to economics and from shop work to domestic science.

A complete college preparatory course is obtained after four years at the local high school. The elementary schools prepare the youngster for the Junior high school, where he is gradually acquainted with the high school system.

The district 49 unit of education consists of four grade schools, one Junior high, and one high school. Students not yet registered are asked to do so at once, because of the difficulty of placing them in classes after the opening date.
