TERRIBLE SWEDES AND LAMPORIS IN ASHLAND TONIGHT

Olsen's Terrible Swedes, the barnstorming independent basketball team that has won over 1000 games in the past 14 years, will meet the Lampport's All-Stars from Medford in a game at the Ashland Junior high school gym tonight at 7:45.

The Swedes were ruled out as competitors with any team wishing to retain their amateur standing, so the game originally scheduled with the BONS was cancelled, and the Lampport's outfit substituted. The St. Mary's All-Stars were considered, but refused for the same reason that the Normal outfit advanced.

Lampport's All-Stars played last year under the name of Texaco All-Stars, and boast several stars from former local high school teams. Archie Laing at center played on a championship team from Medford, as did Herm Newland and Virg Swanson, starting forwards. Newland was chosen on the second all-state team while playing for the Red and Black, and Tully Williams at guard was all-state for three years in a row.

Del Anderson, at the other guard position, made all-state ranking one year, a record for the squad which sounds impressive.

The Swedes boast the tallest basketball player in captivity, "Big Boy" Stoelting, 6 feet 10 inches, who handles a basketball like most kids do a baseball.

"Big Boy" Campbell, a "small" kid of 5 feet 8 inches, is hailed (by the Swedes) as the greatest center in America, but the Lampport bunch think that Archie Laing will take the tipoff regularly, as he has done in the past.

In the 1933-'34 season the Swedes played before 100,000 spectators, and in the 14 years that they have been organized have performed in front of over 1,000,000. Their average height is 6 feet 5 inches, the shoriest of the squad being Carl Howard at 6 feet and 2 inches.

The SONS' first and second teams will play the preliminary, starting at 7 o'clock. They will play 15-minute halves so that the whole thing will be over in time to allow the valley people to attend the president's ball in this city later. The proceeds of tonight's game will go toward a fund to send the SONS' team to the national tournament.

With an impressive record behind them, the Swedes say: "We tank we go home with the Lampport hide." Lampport's don't seem to think so, but the game should be worth seeing.

PORTLAND QUINTS IN USUAL PLACES

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 30.—(AP)—The usual leaders held the upper hand today in the Portland prep basketball race following the opening round yesterday.

Franklin high defeated Benson, 24 to 20, in an overtime game. Portland's other state tournament representative last season, Jefferson, defeated Commerce high, 24 to 21, in a tight game.

Lincoln high, hailed as one of the strongest Portland teams, trampled Grant, 24 to 19. "Little Chief" McLean, brother of the former Benson and present Southern Oregon Normal flash, scored 14 points for Lincoln.

With Anderson, veteran center, 11, Roosevelt lost to Washington high, 26 to 19.

HUSKIES REPEAT WIN OVER OREGON

EUGENE, Ore., Jan. 3.—(AP)—Still in the thick of the championship race after a 22-to-20 win over University of Oregon last night, the University of Washington basketball team today headed for home and a rest.

The win brought the Huskies within half a game of the league-leading Oregon State team and gave them an even break on their four-game invasion of the state.

Oregon State and Washington divided their four games and now both travel practically the same tortuous route of games in the climb toward the championship. Still much in the race is Idaho, which split two games with Washington and has lost only three.

INVITE KLAMATH GOLFERS TO PLAY IN SUNDAY ROUND

Before leaving for Klamath Falls, where he will make arrangements for an inter-city event to be held here next Sunday, Harry McMahon, president of Rogue Valley Golf club, issued a statement yesterday afternoon in appreciation of those who made possible the east-west "Rose Bowl" tournament. FIST FIGHTS ENLIVEN WILD HOCKEY CONTEST FROM OPEN TO CLOSE

EDMONTON, Alta., Jan. 30.—(AP)—A wild hockey game, in which Referee Ambie Moran was totally incapable of controlling the players, saw the Edmonton Eskimos emerge from the cellar of the northwestern professional league last night by defeating Calgary, 9-5.

In the first period had blood was spilled when manager Art Gagne of the Eskimos and Chubby Scott, former Eskimo, grappled.

In the second period, Goals Timmins of Calgary came charging out of his nets at Steve Nickars, Eskimo forward. There was an immediate fist fight in which most of the players participated. Timmins was penalized two minutes and fined \$10. Nickars got five minutes.

The climax to the wildest game of the year came in the third period, a period that lasted 44 minutes instead of the regulation 20.

Moran penalized Gordon McFarlane, Calgary defense man, Frank Shepard and "Smoky" Harris, also of Calgary, and they attempted to talk Moran out of the penalty. All three were ordered from the ice a few minutes later.

Just before the finish Chubby Scott and Art Townsend met near the Calgary goal and it was another slugging match.

Rumor became fact this week when Coach Darwin K. Burgher placed five cubs on the main squad to reinforce the Tiger cage team, weakened by the graduation of Steuart and Hinman.

Hicks, Baker, Ayres, Johnson and Dickerson were all called into active service on the Medford varsity after their fighting display of basketball against Grants Pass last Friday night.

Becoming eligible only yesterday Sam Van Dyke and Bill Luman were switched to posts on the first string, replacing Harvey Sears and Ray Lewis. This new setup places Luman and Smith at forward positions, Van Dyke and Kunzman at guards, with "Stretch" Eittinger jumping center.

Coach Burgher has excellent material this season but, for some unknown reason, up to the present time the team hardly brings back memories of the Callison reign, when every other player was all-state. It is obvious that Burgher is one of the better basketball instructors in the state and could take his present team far were they to fall in line and put out a more inspired brand of ball.

Red Scheel, a product of Coach Burgher's teaching, rated all-state guard in the 1932-1933 season. Alton Landley, Tommy White, George Harrington and Odd Hughes, all ex-Medford high stars, have found berths on freshman and varsity teams on several coast college varsity teams.

If the psychological effect desired from the elevation of the subs is realized, first and second string members will become less sure of their positions. They will strive to hold them and will come to understand that they are playing for the Medford high school and not for personal glory.

The Chemawa Indian school delegation of basketballers will arrive in this city next Friday for a two-game series. The winning or losing of these two games will have no bearing on the decision of the Southern Oregon conference or of the team chosen to play at the Oregon state tournament the middle of March.

It is the belief of many that this is what Lillard has done in signing Belligerent Pete Belcastro of Sacramento to meet Sad Sam Letthers of Texas in a return bout, for the main event of Thursday's card.

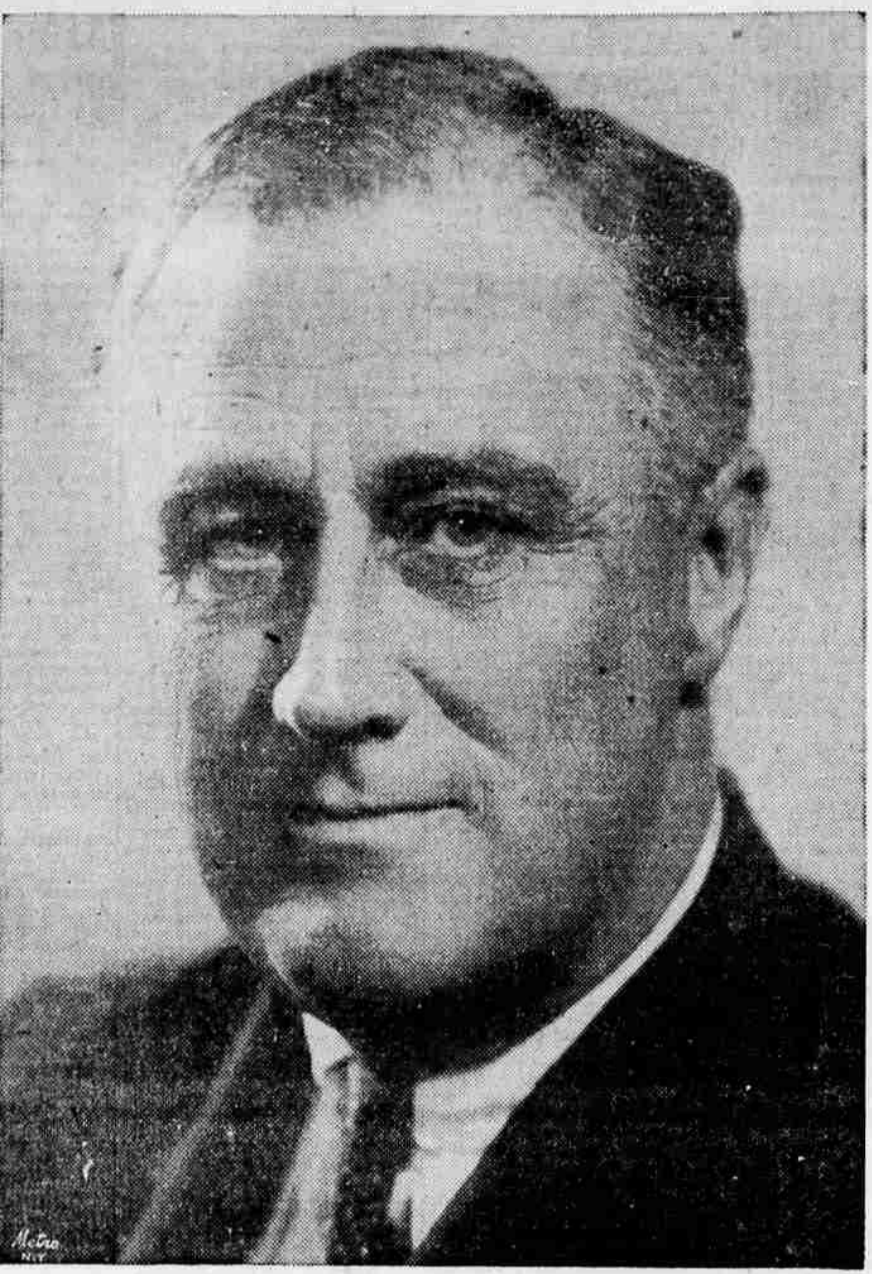
