

DISTRICT WINNERS IN PLAY CONTEST IN FINAL MONDAY

With the preliminary judging of the Jackson county dramatics contest plays near completion interest is centering in final showing of the three district winners at the Medford senior high school auditorium next Monday evening.

Judging of plays in district one has been completed and the Phoenix Grange is the winner of this district with their production, "The Valiant," directed by Katherine Denzer. The Phoenix cast and director are to be congratulated upon their fine interpretation of this play which is a tragedy staged in the warden's office at state's prison. The cast includes: Lester Newby, prison chaplain; Home McReynolds, "the girl"; George Drake, the jailer and Floyd Bell an attendant.

Judges were Doris Baler of Medford high school, Wayne Kenase of Medford junior high school and Frances Nordgren of public library.

Other plays given this week were "Bread" by Eagle Point, directed by Lula Taylor; "Nancy Orr's Day" by Central Point Grange, directed by Edith Bonner; "Corn Fed Babies" by Griffin Creek Home Extension Unit. The winners in districts two and three will be announced Saturday evening at the showing of the Rogue River community play entitled "Old Settlers' Picnic" and at Talent grange hall where "King Row" will be given by the Talent Grange.

Mrs. Effie Birdseye is directing the Rogue River play and Elton Pettit, the Talent play.

The plays have been well attended in every local community and ticket sales for the final showing of the three best plays at the high school auditorium next Monday indicate a record attendance. There were four hundred and fifty in attendance last year and a larger crowd is expected Monday evening.

The small admission charge will be used to defray the expenses of sending the cast of the winning play to Corvallis to represent Jackson county in the State Rural Dramatics Festival at the annual home interest conference February 12.

This county dramatics contest is held annually as a part of the recreation and dramatics project of the extension service under supervision of Mabel C. Mack, county home demonstration agent, and is sponsored by the County Recreation club composed of recreation leaders from 23 communities of Jackson county.

CHARLIE GUEST GRABS LEAD AT GLENDALE BY PAR-SHATTERING PLAY

GLENDALE, Calif., Feb. 1.—(AP)—A dapper driving range professional who has made a habit of popping up with sensational scores at unexpected moments, Charlie Guest, was out in front by two strokes today as a field of 145 players went into the second round of the richest golf tournament of the western winter tours.

In spite of a brisk breeze which swept the Ockmont club yesterday, the Los Angeles pro posted a fine 80 four strokes under par, to take the lead. It was the third time this year that Guest broke loose to give perfect figures a pronounced lagging.

The question uppermost in the minds of the other competitors today was whether he could stand the pace. The most dangerous player in the field, however, as it went into the second round, was MacDonald Smith, that 45-year-old Scotman, who finished second yesterday with a 91. This put him in a tie with Jack Holbrook, local amateur, who led the first half of the field two days ago.

Walter Hagen, winner of 48 titles in many years of competition, showed definitely yesterday he still has some fine shots in his bag by posting a 69. This tied with Al Zimmerman, Pacific northwest champion, and Les Bolstad, Minneapolis, former national public links amateur title holder, two leaders of the first day.

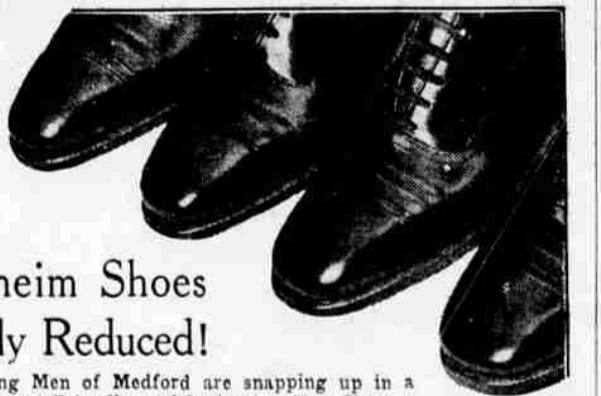
