which was found in Hauptmann's garage. Peter H. Sommer left the stand early in the day after the state accused him of being a professional witness and vigorously attacked the story that he had seen two men and a woman with a blond baby on the night of the kidnapping. Sommer had identified a picture of Fisch as one of the men he saw, and said a picture of the maid, Violet Sharpe, who committed suicide, closely resembled the woman.

Kloppenburg had to acknowledge on cross-examination that he could not say whether or not Fisch had taken away with him the package he brought to the farewell party. His testimony ended at the noon recess.

MILLIONAIRES, BEGGARS BATHE IN RIVER GANGES. CALCUTTA, India, Feb. 4.—(UP)—Millionaires and beggars bathed together in the holy waters of the river Ganges yesterday, gaining, they believed, absolution for their accumulated sins.

Two Other New Cities. "Twenty miles to the south, facing the Tyrrhenian sea (a part of the Mediterranean) is the city of Sabaudia, named in honor of the House of Savoy. This neat little community

is growing like a mushroom near a vast forest that will be its natural park. At the foot of the mountains Pontinia will rise in 1934, swelling the Italian population that 2,500 years ago first settled and farmed the fertile land.

"This great project would not be possible had there not been much silent preparatory engineering work. Since 1926 a special commission, with Senator Natale Prampolini, at the head, has been working steadily. More than 160 miles of highway have been laid, 300 miles of canals dug, and five villages built in the marshy desert. A huge canal, 85 feet wide, gathers flood waters at the foot of the hills, and skirting the lowland, leads them to the sea, 24 miles away. This modern miracle, through the assistance of the Rockefeller Foundation, an organization was set up to fight malaria, because, unless this ancient enemy had been destroyed, it would not have been possible to conquer the land. When the work was started, statistics showed that 95 per cent of the population was infected with the disease, and that virtually no infant reached its first year without an attack of fever. Yellow little faces and sunken eyes stared at you in the medieval streets. Now new cases are nearly unknown, and pink and white cherubs greet you everywhere."

ROME'S BACKDOOR PROBLEM SOLVED BY DUCE'S ORDER

Fertile Farm Area Reclaimed From Once Desolate Marshes Southeast of City for War Veterans

WASHINGTON, D. C.—(Sp.)—Italy has a new province (a political subdivision within the country somewhat similar to England's "county" or "shire") Premier Benito Mussolini, on December 18, dedicated the 3rd Italian province, Littoria, a fertile farm area recently reclaimed from the once desolate and malarial Pontine marshes southeast of Rome.

The drab swampland of a short time ago has become a pleasant region of golden wheat fields, vegetable gardens, sparkling canals, and budding orchards. In modern farmhouses and in several landscaped new cities dwell more than 60,000 former service men and their families.

A bulletin from the Washington, D. C., headquarters of the National Geographic society describes the remarkable transformation of this area which has been Rome's "backdoor" problem since the days of the Caesars.

Wild Boars Roamed in Thickets. "A little over two years ago Premier Benito Mussolini gave orders that the stagnant waters of the Pontine marshes should be drained off to the sea, malaria should be ended, 4000 farmhouses built and populated with as many peasant families drawn from the crowded farming provinces of the north, and that three cities—should rise in the deserted land," the bulletin continues.

"The waste and flooded plain at the very doors of Rome was to become a garden and to supply part of the food needs of the Italian capital. The order is being carried out as scheduled and the project today is in first-class shape.

"Where two and a half years ago wild boars roamed in the broom thickets, you can see the neat little city of Littoria. All the surrounding land is dotted by hundreds of bright, healthful farmhouses, replacing the squalid wooden huts where pigs and chickens once shared the misery of a few marsh dwellers.

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SALEM, Ore. (UP)—More than 8,000 different animal brands are on file with the division of animal industries of the department of agriculture, reported Division Chief W. H. Lytle, whose office keeps track of the methods used by livestock owners to identify their property.

Since the inauguration of the system of filing the brands in 1915, the office has checked every registered mark to make sure it is unlike any other. Cattle, horse, sheep, goat, hog, fox and poultry brands are included in the files.

Fire brands are used most on larger animals, but many other methods are now in use. A liquid paint brand that has a corrosive action on the skin is being developed for use on short-haired animals. Tattoo brands are used on the webs of the wings of poultry. Sometimes the toe-webs are punch-marked.

Fire brands are submitted on a burned blotter, others are made by tracing in order to get the brand in a form for filing.

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ALIEN WIVES BAN TO GUARD STATE SECRETS OF CHINA

NANKING—(AP)—As a means of protecting state secrets from the prying eyes and ears of foreigners, the Chinese government has forbidden Chinese military men and diplomats to marry women of other nationalities.

The new rules require government employees who are already married to foreigners to supply detailed information on the "background" of their wives.

Among the things the government would like to know about the foreigner who has "married into" Chinese government service are: Does she maintain close contact with her friends and family back home? How often does she return to her homeland? Has she a good knowledge of the Chinese language? Diplomats already married to aliens are barred from representing China in the country of origin of their wives.

Officials of the army, navy, and air services who are married to foreigners and are engaged in intelligence or secret service work, are being shifted to other duties.
