

15 PWA PROPOSALS TO AID STATE ARE TOLD LEGISLATURE

Construction, Operation and Financing of Projects Would Be Helped by Proposed State Legislation

SALEM, Feb. 6.—(AP)—Federal proposals presented to Oregon to enable the state, its municipalities and other legal subdivisions to obtain full benefit of loans and grants that may be made available through the federal public works program were submitted to the state legislature here yesterday afternoon by Governor Charles H. Martin in his third special message of the day.

The 15 definite proposals, covering seven closely typewritten pages, were presented by the executive, who declared he had no opportunity to examine them in detail, but urged careful consideration. They were presented to both houses without specific recommendations. The bills, prepared by Harold I. Jokes, federal emergency administrator of public works, will be sent to the attorney-general for approval as to form and constitutionality.

Refers to Power Proposal.
In his message, however, the governor referred to the last four proposals "providing for the creation of power districts and rural electrification authorities, for the purpose of promoting the fullest possible use of electric energy in the state by making it available at the lowest cost, consistent with sound economy and prudent management."
"The creation of these authorities and power districts will enable them to borrow money from the federal government against their anticipated revenues without placing the taxing power back onto the districts and authorities so created."

"These measures should receive careful consideration as affording an opportunity to fit the program of the state in with the apparent program of the federal government with reference to the utilization of power to be developed at Bonneville and other places."

15 Acts Listed.
Briefly listed, the 15 acts would enact the following measures:

1. Authorizing cities and towns to construct and operate projects and undertakings.
2. Simplifying procedure for construction and financing public works projects by municipalities, enabling municipalities to make and perform contracts with federal agencies.
3. Amending Oregon laws to permit further issuance of bonds by school districts.
4. Providing for the private sale to the United States or agency of bonds by any school district for the purpose of financing new school buildings or repairs or improvements.
5. Validating, ratifying, approving and confirming bonds and other instruments or obligations heretofore issued by public bodies of this state for public works projects.
6. Declaring valid proceedings heretofore taken for the authorization and issuance of bonds by any city for the purpose of financing in whole or in part construction and improvement of waterworks systems.
7. Declaring valid proceedings taken heretofore for issuance of bonds and authorization for financing construction of school buildings or other improvements.
8. Validating bonds issued by any city for purpose of financing construction or improvements of waterworks or reservoir projects.
9. Declaring the necessity of creating public bodies known as housing authorities to provide dwellings.
10. Authorizing cities, towns and state and subdivisions to cooperate with housing authorities and the United States in providing for roads and other facilities in the housing program; to require any city or town having population of more than 7,000 inhabitants, located within housing authority, to make appropriation for the first year's administrative expenses; and to permit cities to make grants and lend money to such housing authorities.
11. Authorizing corporate agencies of the United States and corporations receiving aid from the United States to exercise the power of eminent domain to acquire property for housing projects.
12. Providing for incorporation of improvements authorities for furnishing water, sewerage, gas or electric heat, light or power services and to issue bonds.
13. Creating the rural electrification authority for Oregon for purpose of promoting and encouraging fullest possible use of electric energy in the state.
14. Providing for the creation of power districts.
15. Providing for the formation of non-profit membership corporations to be known as electric membership corporations for the purpose of promoting and encouraging fullest use of electric energy at lowest possible cost.

All measures would attach the emergency clause.
In relation to the power proposals other suggestions were made which were left to the state policy on such issues, such as regulation and taxability of property.

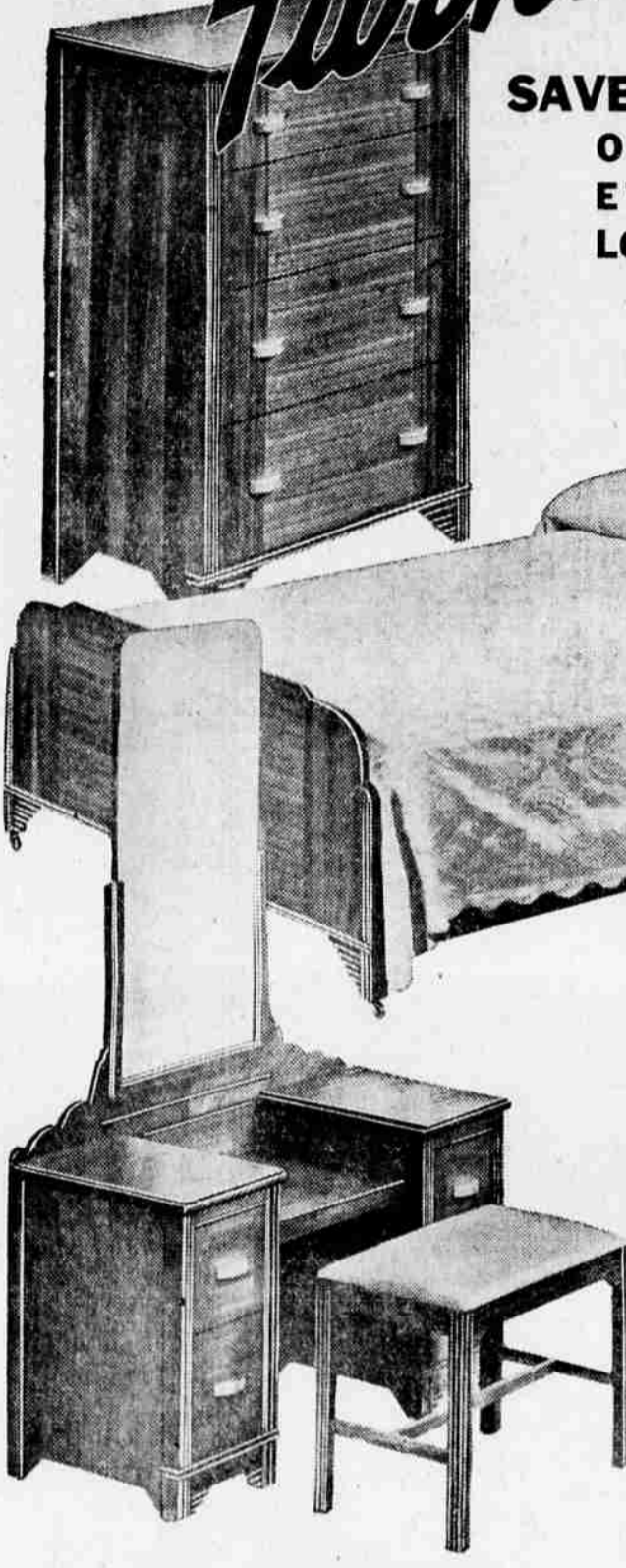
