

NAB SMALL BOYS WHILE STEALING CAR REFLECTORS

A most unusual sort of crime was discovered last night, when four small boys were apprehended by city police, charged with stealing the small red and green reflector buttons used to hold automobile license plates in place.

DEVELOPMENT OF COUNTY WILL BE COMMITTEE'S AIM

The initial meeting of the Jackson county development committee was held last night, and O. O. Alenderfer was elected chairman.
Apples of Ashland, chosen as vice-chairman. It was unanimously decided to ask Karl Janouch, superintendent of Hog River national forest, to be committeeman at large. Janouch accepted.

Many ideas were expressed by the various members on the different phases to be launched under the five-year development program planned by the committee. Development of production, on a larger scale, of onions, berries, beans and other similar products was discussed and it was stated that the most important need of Jackson county is water in sufficient quantities to allow for all irrigation needs.

The next most important need of the community is the completion of the proposed Skakyou freight facilities to large centers of population, the members decided.
Other important development projects to be worked on in the five-year program are those relating to perishable crops, pasture and timber lands, cattle and beef, oiling of roads and building of needed new ones, taxation, and tourist development.

Harold Grey outlined the work of the SERA in this section, and suggested that the five-year development plan, through the medium of the committee, would be of benefit in presenting projects for SERA work. Projects to be of permanent good to the county could thus be financed.

FARMERS' CENSUS CHIEF HERE SOON

Word has been received that Supervisor Finley of Eugene in charge of the federal farm census for western Oregon, will be here next week to complete arrangements for launching the census in this county, and the examination and appointment of five enumerators. PUGET SOUND TRIMS WILLAMETTE, 28-26

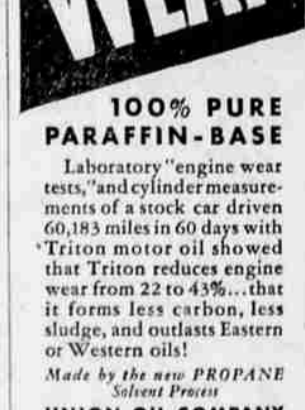
