

KIDNAP SUSPECT SLUGS DETECTIVE TO MAKE ESCAPE

AURORA, Ill., Feb. 8.—(AP)—James Doyle, under indictment in connection with the Bremer kidnaping, slugged a federal department of justice agent last night and escaped by leaping through a window of a hotel.

Doyle was in the custody of two federal agents who were bringing him to Chicago by airplane. The pilot, unable to locate the municipal airport, made a forced landing on the farm of E. L. Mastick of Yorkville, near Aurora and about 50 miles southwest of Chicago.

With their prisoner handcuffed, the agents drove to the Hotel Nading, Yorkville, where one of the agents called the department of justice office at Chicago.

While his companion was phoning, the second agent led Doyle to the hotel bar and removed the handcuffs. The officer ordered two beers, Grace Larrison, a waitress who witnessed the escape, said. "The prisoner slipped his beer away and seemed to be watching his guard's movements. Suddenly, just as the federal officer raised his glass, the prisoner struck him on the chin and the officer fell to the floor."

"Like a flash the prisoner turned around and leaped through the closed window into a side yard. I saw him race out the gate and across the street where he jumped into an automobile and drove away. While the agent fired at him through the window."

PROMISE FARMERS HEAVY BENEFIT IN SEASON FROM AAA

WASHINGTON, Feb. 8.—(AP)—Government economists said today this country's farmers are assured government checks for \$422,250,000 this year. They estimated the sum may rise half a billion dollars.

Under the AAA program which started May 12, 1933, more than 10 million checks for \$1,817,000 had been passed up by this largest of the new government agricultural agencies as of this month.

Secretary Wallace estimated 1935 benefit payments for reductions on wheat, corn, soybeans, cotton, sugar, peanuts, and other crops.

The corn-tinger total may vary according to the number of acres. An official estimate on tobacco benefit payments also is delayed for this reason. However, reductions in acreage removal for this year indicates the benefit will be below the 1934 total of \$18,000,000 and a conservative rough estimate is said to be \$10,000,000.

Cost of the AAA from inception until the start of this year was \$733,883,884, according to Charles C. Davis said. But of this amount only \$35,184,780 was for administration expenses. The bulk was paid in rental and benefit payments to producers and purchases of supplies.

ARREST BLUNDER COSTS PAIR JOBS

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 8.—(AP)—Because of their blunder in arresting an innocent woman, Miss Katherine and Miss Mabel, of the street and hustling her to jail despite protests, State Narcotics Agents Robert Stumpson and Fred Stinson were suspended from service today.

William O. Walker, head of the narcotics division, gave the suspension order from Los Angeles through his office here.

Miss Mitchell, who told indignantly of being roughly handled and of being stripped by a man at the jail in a search for narcotics, declared she will sue the state for false arrest.

WORK INSURANCE TAX PROPOSAL IS CLAIMED ILLEGAL

WASHINGTON, Feb. 8.—(AP)—Congress was told today by the National Association of Manufacturers that the unemployment insurance tax proposed in the administration's social security bill is unconstitutional.

James A. Emery, general counsel of the association, made two objections to the bill insurance provisions of the measure, in his testimony before the House ways and means committee, although he approved the general purposes of the legislation.

The objections were: 1. That the 3 per cent tax on payrolls would be levied on the ability of the employer to pay. He testified that the unemployment insurance tax was "not a tax intended for the purpose of raising revenue but for the purpose of producing conditions."
