INDIANS WILL GET SO. DAKOTA LANDS

WASHINGTON, Feb. 9.—(AP)—"Let's give the land back to the Indians."

That jocular remark has long been a favorite with the farmers whenever they felt fed up with droughts, storms, pests or hard times.

Now the government is doing just that: taking land out from under the plow to give it to the original Americans. It has just accepted options to buy 30,771 acres in Todd county, South Dakota.

Officials said the land, classed as submarginal, is being acquired from white settlers who found it inadequate for a living. The Indian bureau will take over this and other

land for the benefit of reservation Indians, to improve grazing facilities.
