

Klamath Falls to Pit Strong Quint Against Tigers Here Tonight

ACTION PROMISED WHEN OLD RIVALS COME TOGETHER

Teams Will Play Again Saturday Night in Klamath —Main Game Starts at 8 P. M. — Preliminary at 7

With two hard games in store for his team tonight and tomorrow night, Coach Burgher last evening sent his men through a light workout with no scrimmage, and only a slight amount of practice shooting. He declares that his outfit is in perfect physical shape for their double billing with the Klamath Falls Pelicans at eight o'clock tonight and Saturday.

The Pelicans arrived this afternoon, accompanied by a large delegation of Klamath rooters, and several car loads more are expected to arrive before game time. The bunch from over the hill are said to be in excellent condition, and are anxious to dump the locals, something that is not too hard to understand.

Indications before the game are that it will be close and fast, with more than ordinary signs that it will be tough. When two teams are evenly matched they are apt to forget the more delicate niceties of the game, and fight for every point. The two teams meeting for the first time this year have records of approximately even merit.

A game scheduled early in the year with Chillicothe, which was to be played tomorrow night, has been cancelled, and the Tigers and Pelicans will again tangle in Klamath Falls tomorrow.

Most of the glaring faults of the locals have been completely obliterated. Kunzman has overcome his habit of travelling with the ball, Smith has learned to avoid head-on collisions with his enemies, a factor which formerly chalked many personal fouls against the big guard, who is to start at center tonight. Luman, Sears and Campbell have all developed a dead-eye for the bucket, and their floor work has advanced in great bounds, until now they work together like old veterans.

Van Dyke, who experienced some difficulty in connecting with the ring in the Roseburg game a week ago is said to be back in his old form, and is switching them from all angles. If the team works together tonight, as they claim they will, the result should prove gratifying on the score board.

Klamath Falls will present an aggressive offense tonight, and the Tigers will have to call upon every defensive trick that they have learned. They do not intend to depend on their defense, however, according to Coach Burgher, but will "shoot the works" with everything in the offensive line as well.

FUNNY LOOKING POODLE SELECTED BEST DOG IN MADISON SQUARE SHOW

NEW YORK, Feb. 15.—(AP)—The "top" in American dogdom is, of all things, a poodle with this tiring title, Champion Nonsoe Duc de la Terrasse of Blakoen.

Nonsoe Duc de la Terrasse was chosen best dog last night in the Westminster Kennel club show at Madison Square Garden. The selection was greeted by muffled hand-clapping by the expert ringmasters.

But from the gallery, where sat those uneducated in the finer points of the fancy, but who think they know a dog when they see one, came a chorus of boos and exclamations of astonishment.

A specialized sense of appreciation was necessary to recognize the virtues of Nonsoe Duc de la Terrasse. He was sleek in spots, clipped bare in others. He resembled somewhat an under-sized lion that had fallen into a tub of whitewash.

In winning the coveted title of "best in show," all breeds, the poodle owned by the Blakoen kennels of New York, downed five other dogs, survivors of group competition.

Nonsoe Duc de la Terrasse made history by his victory. Only once before in the history of the Westminster, America's premier kennel show, has a non-sporting dog been adjudged best of all breeds.



SPORT SLANTS

The long strides basketball has made towards becoming a popular sports spectacle serves to remind one of a wonder court team of 20 odd years ago—the Original Celtics.

Only one of the "absolutely" original five remains in active competition. He is Pete Barry. Together with Joe Lapchick, Dutch Dehnert and Dave Benka, veterans of the days when the Celtics were proud world champions, Barry piles his basketball trade from town to town.

A couple of youngsters complete the troupe, but in the main it is the veterans with their glamorous pasts whom the fans pay to see in action.

The reports have it that the Celtics are profiting from the boom basketball is enjoying generally, netting something in the neighborhood of \$5,000 apiece for the 100 games they play in a season. Not the princely sum they made in their hey-day, perhaps, but quite enough considering the fun they get from the sport.

Not only do they offer samples of their ball-handling wizardry, but often slow down, when safely in the lead, and amuse the customers with a bit of well-developed comedy.

Celtic cage clinics! Davey Banks, the official clown of the team, gets the laughs by bouncing the ball between the opponents' legs or caroming passes off his guard's head or chest. Banks was, for many

years, recognized as one of the world's greatest basketball shots. For that matter he still can pop them in.

Another neat stunt used by the Celtics to gain favor is their basketball clinic. For an hour or so before the game they conduct "classes." Plays and systems are explained and demonstrated to amateur players and coaches. Certainly the Celtics are qualified to teach the court game if any one is.

The real marvel of the team, of course, is Pete Barry. He has been playing professional basketball for 22 years and roughly estimates that he has taken part in 2500 games. Scoring

an average of 10 points a game—and he certainly has done at least that—his points total borders on \$5,000.

Fete is on the shady side of 40 and slightly fat. Yet he can move around the court as fast as the next fellow. Off the court Barry wears glasses.

A Pioneer Flyer

Dutch Dehnert is credited with originating the pivot play, the maneuver which has stirred up so much controversy among basketball followers. It happened one evening when the Celtics were enjoying a safe lead and had decided to give the fans a laugh or two. Dehnert implanted himself on the "spot" and began feed-

ing the ball out in all directions with all sorts of queer passes. It occurred to Dutch that the play had possibilities and he set about developing it.

It's wide usage today proves the merit of his discovery.

Joe Lapchick serves as coach and manager of the team. He was once recognized as the highest paid basketball star, drawing \$10,000 per season. More than likely his income is still "top," although he rarely plays more than half a game at each stand.

The Celtics are about the only really successful team of basketball barnstormers. Anywhere they unfold

their court magic they do so before plenty of each customer.

All in all, I imagine the Celtics have a fairly good time of it, and give a worthwhile performance wherever they show. At least they "leave 'em laughing."
