SPONGE BOAT TRAGEDY FOUND ON SEA BOTTOM

ST. PETERSBURG, Fla., Feb. 15.—(AP)—Charred wreckage of the sponge boat Kios, last seen in November, 1933, and bones and diving helmets of at least two of the missing crew of five, have been found in 30 feet of water 12 miles off Cedar Key, according to word received here today from the sponge fishing colony at Tarpon Springs.

Evidence that the divers perished when their boat burned above them, cutting off their air supply, was found in the condition of the helmets.

CONVICTION OF BRUNO INSPIRATION OF POEM BY MEDFORD WRITER

Opal Wheeler Mooter, local poetess, who recently had three poems, "Timber Line Pine," "In a Mountain Cabin" and "Sunrise," published in the American States Anthology, from the Gallean Press in New York, has written another poem which seems particularly apt at this time. On the night that the Lindbergh baby was kidnapped Mrs. Mooter composed a poem "To Anne," and the night that the child's body was found another poem came from her pen, "Little White Eagle." This poem received wide publicity, having been printed in Portland papers and elsewhere, and has become one of her best known works.

Now comes another, written at the time of Bruno Hauptmann's conviction of the terrible crime. This is the first printing of the poem, titled "A Hauptmann."

Perhaps it was a plan that for a little while this alien had marked the time should nest secure within our land.

Rest, as though Not even God Had marked the time Nor reckoned who Laid sorrow bare.


There, it was he... Do not stare, into oblivion Let him pass quietly.
