

FAMED BOTANIST KEEPING COUNTRY STORE IN WEST

Shirt-Sleeved Proprietor Is Consulted by Experts of World Renown — Long With Harvard University

KANSAS CITY, Mo.—(UP)—Benjamin Franklin Bush is the shirt-sleeved owner of a general store to most of the folks in Courtney, near here.

Bush, who is 77, is one of the few honorary members of the Smithsonian Institution. He is in frequent correspondence with Dr. Paul Aellen of Basel, Switzerland, an outstanding botanical authority of the world.

Two treaties on trees by Bush will appear in the new "Manual of the Southeastern States" soon to be published by Dr. John K. Small, head of the New York Botanical Garden.

In the 13 years Bush was employed by Harvard university as shrub and plant collector he trained Ernest J. Palmer in plant lore. Today Palmer is in charge of the botanical department at Harvard.

Studies Woods Now Bush gives his particular attention to woods now, he explained. "Woods are just a pest to most folks," he explained, "but to scientists they mean a great deal more."

Thousands of Inquiries Bush gets thousands of orders and letters of inquiry from Europe as well as American interests and botanical magazines.

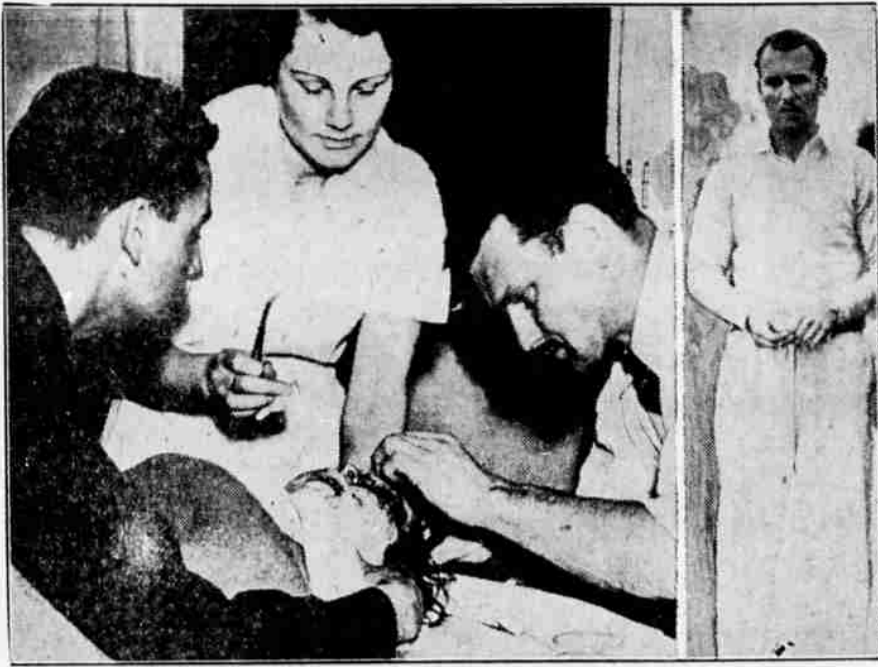

These include the anti-injunction law, eliminate the provision that the state police shall not be called out in times of labor troubles; providing for disputes between employers and employees being submitted to a state board of conciliation and requiring a period of 30 days in which to effect a settlement before employers have the right to picket.

Surtax Next. If time permits after the expected oratory the house will then turn its attention to a bill providing for property tax relief by a surtax on income for the purpose of providing funds for the support and maintenance of public schools. The bill would lower the exemptions from income tax payments and increase the rates. Appropriation bills coming before the house members with adverse reports and which were killed by indefinite postponement would have authorized the renovating of the Oregon building erected on the site of the Lewis and Clark exposition in Portland; appropriate \$5000 for the establishment of a scientific crime detection laboratory and appropriating \$200,000 to make loans to teachers and employes of financially distressed school districts.
